

### For What It's Worth

By the time this gets into print, I imagine that Governor Robert Holmes will have been duly censured by the teaching profession of Oregon for his unexpected criticism of them at their annual state convention. Certainly his remarks must have fallen as a

bombshell among the state's as-semble pedagogues, for it was but a year ago that this same group bestowed upon him first citizen honors as a friend of the profes-sion.  
Disregarding argument pertain-ing to the truthfulness of his as-ertions, I must admit that I cer-tainly admire the governor's cour-age. In the first place he broke the standard rule of procedure for dignitaries addressing any con-

vention; for as everyone knows, such speakers are invited solely for the purpose of doing out sweet talk aimed at assuring those present that their particular group is the answer to all worldly prob-lems, past, present and future. Governor Holmes had the nerve to criticize. The shock must have been paralyzing.  
To make matters even more shocking, he had the audacity to criticize the teaching profession which in the past ten or twenty years has established itself as a special variety of sacred cow which is always to be pitied but never censured. In spite of the fact that dissatisfaction has been expressed at times with the pro-duct being turned out by the schools, very few critics have had the temerity to imply that those who do the teaching or who teach teachers to teach might share in the blame.

Such a state of affairs is far from being a healthy one. No profession, can take the risk of claiming for itself perfection, for by so doing it shows itself to be imperfect. To resent criticism is a sign of acknowledged weakness; to welcome it and to weigh it shows a stature capable of greater growth.  
The latter is the attitude which should be taken by those of us who claim to be teachers. When the governor implies that some of us may be more interested in better salaries than in better teaching, let us try on the shoe for size. And if he should go even farther and suggest that perhaps high salaries are not necessarily a guarantee of good teaching, can we afford for the sake of our profession to call him a liar with-out first examining the evidence?

**SICK LEAVE FOR COUNTY EMPLOYEES**  
WHEREAS, Curry County, Oregon employees are not presently receiving payment for days on which they are unable to work by reason of illness; and

WHEREAS, Section 203.120 S 15 O. R. S. empowers this Court to provide for the granting of employees; and  
WHEREAS, it is the desire of this Court to relieve the full time employees of Curry County from part of the hardships accompanying the misfortune of illness;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED that all regular full time, non-elective, employees of Curry County, Oregon be allowed one day of sick leave with full pay for each full calendar month of regular employment.

Days of sick leave unused may accumulate for later use, but in event shall the total accumulated days of sick leave exceed 24 days.

Sick leave time shall be available only for full days of absence from regular employment because of actual illness requiring such absence.

NEITHER CURRENT OR ACCUMULATED SICK LEAVE SHALL BE USED FOR VACATION PURPOSES OR FOR ANY PURPOSE OTHER THAN ABSENCE OCCASIONED BY ACTUAL ILLNESS REQUIRING THE ATTENTION OF A PHYSICIAN, WHOSE CERTIFICATE AS TO THE NATURE AND DURATION OF SUCH ILLNESS SHALL BE REQUIRED TO BE PRESENTED TO THE COUNTY COURT BEFORE SUCH PAYMENT OF SICK LEAVE BENEFITS UNDER THIS ORDER SHALL BE MADE.

Sick leave benefits herein provided shall be for those employees of Curry County who are regular, full time, employees of Curry County regularly and continuously employed not less than Regular hours monthly.
