

Closed Season On Burning Near

April 1 marks the beginning of the closed season on burning in the forested areas of the state coming under the jurisdiction of the state and federal protective organizations, according to a statement issued today by State Forester Dwight L. Phipps.

This means that permits must first be secured from a warden or a ranger if any slashings, brush

or debris is to be burned within the forested areas, Phipps added.

"In addition", the forester stated, "all logging operations and other woods activities that have occasion to use power-driven equipment must have tool boxes with tools suitable for forest fire fighting, landings must be cleared of inflammable debris, watchman service provided and other precautionary measures taken that will tend to prevent the start or spread of fires."

Phipps pointed out that the various state inspectors have been busy checking the woods opera-

tions in order to give instructions as to closed season requirements. He also added that the inspections will be continued periodically throughout the fire season in order to check observance of the law.

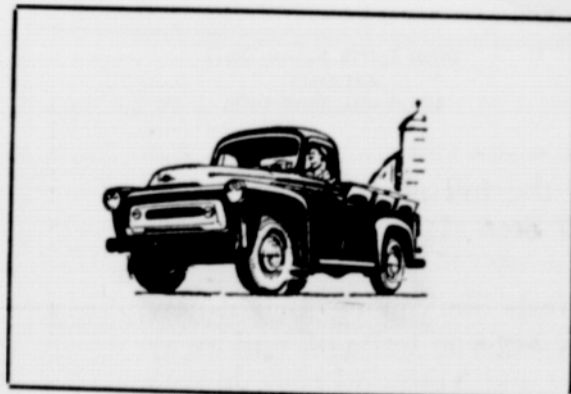
