Lumber Demands Remain Sickly

Lumber market activity slackened this week while prices held to the advances made last week, according to Random Lengths, Eugene weekly lumber market letter.

Normally April brings an increase in mill production as well as market demand, but so far it has failed to materialize. Demand will probably remain low so long as the rate of housing starts continues at a slow pace. On the other hand, if mill productions exceeds present levels with no upturn in demand, another siege of weakened prices is inevitable.

After a brief sharp upswing, stud prices leveled or dropped

back slightly the past week.

Except for a temporary slowdown in the blizzard-swept Midwest states, the retail yard market for mixed cars of green and kiln dried lumber retains the moderate improvement it developed over the past two weeks.

Definite market improvement continues throughout the Western Pine region, the only slowdown being in the snowbound consuming areas. During the past two weeks there's been more inquiry and firm business as mills improved their unfilled order position. Mills reporting to the Western Pine Association report that sales exceed production by a comfortable margin.

Plywood producers report comfortable order files, and both sheathing and sanded stock are holding the firmness gained recently.

Oregonians Back World Arms Cut, Mobile U. S. Forces

Smaller and more mobile U. S. and allied armed forces as part of a world-wide cut in arms and support of a United Nations' police force to stop "little wars" were favored by Oregon "Great Decisions" discussion groups voting on "What U. S. Military Strategy in the Nuclear Age?"

Ballots from 300 discussion groups in 22 Oregon counties were tabulated this week by Oregon State college extension service. This was the seventh in a series of eight foreign policy issues for the 1957 Great Decisions program.

On the question of basic military strategy for the U. S., Oregon ballots rated policy alternatives in the following order:
50 percent thought we should try to build armed forces, along with our allies, that are better equipped and more mobile than communist forces even though they may not be so numerous.

22 percent favored a similar approach in finding a workable compromise between a few well-armed, mobile troop units and a

comfortable civilian economy in which the military budget is not a burden.

Another 22 percent said we should realize that we cannot match Russia man for man and should build a super "retaliatory

force only, concentrating on aircraft and new weapons. This would leave supply of ground troops to our allies.

Least popular of alternatives to the question was the building of armed forces to protect the con-

tinental U. S. without regard to the rest of the world.

On the question of how to prepare for a possible surprise attack, alternatives were rated as follows: 22 percent thought we should step up construction of radar and

other warning systems in the U. S.

21 percent would raise armed forces pay and benefits to build a "professional" military establishment followed by a cut or elimination of the draft.
