

## Get Final Returns On March of Dimes

The final returns from the March of Dimes drive in Brookings and Harbor are finally in—and they look very good. This year's campaign exceeded last years by nearly \$200, and at a time when cash wasn't as easy to come by either.

Shelly Shelamar, treasurer of the Lions Club, who undertook the drive reported that a total of

\$1,526.66 was raised in the area this year, compared to \$1353 last year. Ralph Reed was chairman of the March of Dimes campaign, put on so effectively by the Lions.

Shelamar reported that the basketball game brought in \$69.50. The annual party at the Cliff House brought in a huge total of \$565.25; the Variety Show brought in \$364.97; and the bowling tournament brought in \$170.11.

A gift by the Square Dancing club was \$31.00, while letters and canisters brought in \$325.82 to the fund.

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## County Land to Be Withdrawn For Development

The proposed withdrawal of 90 acres of public land along the Sixes River in northern Curry County for development and management of fishery resources was announced today by Virgil T. Heath, Oregon State Supervisor of the Bureau of Land Management at Portland.

The application which was filed by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, Department of the Interior, was recorded on the public land records in the Land Office at Portland, on January 12, 1956, and an amendment was recorded on October 3, 1956. The effect of the recordation was temporarily to ban entry, selection or disposal under the public land laws and location under the general mining laws in the affected areas pending action on the application by the Department of the Interior.

The public lands involved are located along the Sixes River in northern Curry County and are popular for their cutthroat, rainbow, salmon and steelhead fishery resources. The objective of the withdrawal is to develop, manage and preserve these uses and resources for the benefit of the public.

A period of 30 days from the date of publication of the notice in the Federal Register, is provided during which comments or objections may be submitted by the public.

A detailed description of the land involved will appear shortly in the Federal Register and will be posted in the Land Office at Portland, Oregon, District Forester's Office at Coos Bay, Oregon, and in local post offices and the courthouse. The land proposed for withdrawal is under the supervision of the District Forester of the Bureau of Land Management at Coos Bay, Oregon.

## Bud Shafers Take Surfside Court

Mr. and Mrs. Bud Shafer, of Barstow, California, have purchased the Surfside Trailer Court in Harbor, with the purchase taking effect immediately.

Shafer, who came west from Broken Bow, Nebr., 10 years ago, and his wife Nellie have one son, Mark, 19 months old. Shafer was connected with the Ford Agency in Barstow.

Plans are being made for extensive improvement in the trailer park, which provides for a picnic area, plus fishing facilities. No name change for the trailer court is planned.

Cecil Young is Mrs. Shafer's father, and Charlie Young is her uncle, so they are not entirely strangers to the area.

## Business Activities Appear Favorable

Despite recurring talk of a possible slackening in business it appears that the outlook for the second quarter of 1957 in the 11 western states and Hawaii is again highly favorable.

A poll of 1,000 western business leaders conducted by the western home office of Prudential Insurance Co. indicates that approximately 81 per cent expect that the upcoming quarter will be as good or better than the same quarter a year ago.

More than 35 per cent of those responding to the query predict that their business will increase from one to 10 per cent. Another 13 per cent of those polled expect increases of 11 per cent or more and in some instances increases of more than 30 per cent were predicted.

The Prudential poll indicates that in the Pacific Northwest region, 77 per cent of those queried expect their business in the coming quarter will equal or exceed the results of the second quarter or 1956.

A tabulation of the poll by industries shows that leaders in the public utility field are the most optimistic. Utility executives were unanimous in predicting better business next quarter than a year ago.

The Prudential poll indicates that manufacturing and service businesses also were highly optimistic. In these classifications 88 per cent of those who responded to the query expect levels to equal or pass last year.

The first amphibious landing was made in March 1776 by Continental Marines, who captured Fort Montague on the island of New Providence in the Bahamas.

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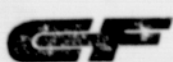
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
