### Newsman to Speak at Dinner

John C. Metcalf, ace newspaperman, foreign correspondent, editor, writer, and speaker of parts, will be the next guest at the California-Oregon Knife & Fork club, according to Mrs. Gail Ebbutt, secretary, who is chairman of the committee on arrangements.

Plans are being made to take care of the large crowd of local members and their out-of-town guests who are expected to be on hand when this very much decorated newsman speaks.

Hailed today as one of the very best newspapermen in the United States, Metcalf started with the Associated Press in 1952. Hidden away as a member of the German-American Band, he was the first to give attention to subversive movements. It was largely due to his efforts which reached the halls of Congress that ringleaders of that movement were either jailed or expelled from the United States and the backbone of it was broken.

John Metcalf is well known in the Latin American countries as he is in the United States and Europe, because of his many appearances at International Conferences. He has been awarded the Silver Plaque of the National Headliner club for outstanding achievements in American Journalism and the Chicago Advisory Board chose him for its Gold Plaque given for meritorious service in the cause of Americanism, and during World War II, the King of Norway awarded him the famous St. Olaf medal for his distinguished journalistic services.

The dinner meeting is slated for Sunday, April 7, at the new annex of the fairgrounds pavilion, with dinner served at 7:00 p.m. Members with last name initials beginning from "N" and including "Z" may bring local guests. House-guests are always welcome.
