Chessman Named To Highway Comm.

Robert B. Chessman, 36-year-old publisher of the Astorian-Budget and manager of Astoria radio station KAST, was named Friday by Governor Robert D. Holmes to the three-man State Highway Commission.

Chessman, who will give Oregon's populous first district its first representative on the Commission in eight years, succeeds Ben R. Chandler Sr. of Coos Bay whose term expires March 31. Chessman's term will be for three years.

Chandler, chairman of the commission and one of its members for 21 years, had announced he would not be a candidate for re-appointment.

The new commissioner, a registered Independent in his politics is a native of Oregon. He was born at Astoria, Feb. 18, 1921 and except for war service has been a resident ever since. Following graduation from Astoria High School he attended the Univ. of Oregon for one year.

Chessman's appointment presents a unique father-son pattern on the Highway Commission. His father, Merle R. Chessman, a former state senator from Clatsop Co. and Astorian-Budget publisher until his death, served from 1943 to 1946 on the Commission.

Chessman joins two Republicans on the commission. They are Charles H. Reynolds, La Grande whose term expires next March 31, and M. K. McIver, Portland, whose term expires March 31, 1959. They through the State Highway Department, direct Oregon's state highway affairs.

Wanda Thompson was elected president of the Beta Lota Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi in a meeting held Tuesday at the home of Ruth Payne.

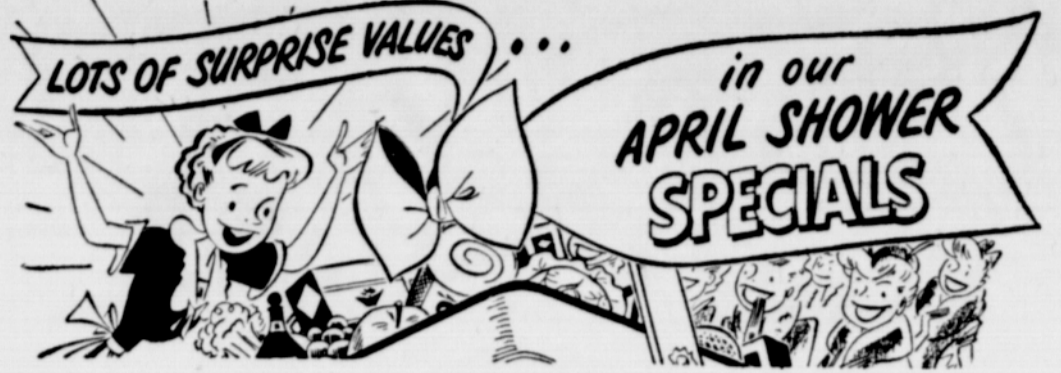
