

Boy Scouts to Make Plans for 1957 Activities at Tsiltcoos Camp Session

Plans for 1957 activities will be hatched amidst a real scouting atmosphere this weekend when executives and leaders of the Oregon Trail Council gather at Camp Tsiltcoos south of Florence for their yearly planning conference.

Outdoor camping and cooking will highlight the session, a follow up to the recent Council Review meeting in Eugene. Coals established at the Review will be put into active programs at the

coast conference. Representatives from each of the 10 districts, covering six counties (Benton, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Lane and Lincoln), will meet on committees to formulate the '57 program.

The committees are Activities, Advancement, Camping, Finance, Exploiter (program planning), Health and Safety, Leadership Training, Organization and Extension and Public Relations.

The sessions will get underway

Saturday, April 6, with a "how" session for commissioners in the afternoon. This will prelude a Scouters "Whing-Ding" celebration in the evenings.

A morning meeting Sunday will

see a gathering of the district commissioners with the committees, followed by a Council Executive Board meeting at 1 p.m.

Recreation at the conference will include moskeet and archery, along with games, songs and general fellowship. An outdoor barbecue and traditional cracker barrel discussions will feature Saturday evening.

Recommended equipment for those planning to attend includes a sleeping bag or air mattress, toilet articles, camp clothing, a hearty appetite and a rugged constitution—according to hosts for the session.

First Work Set For 101 Project

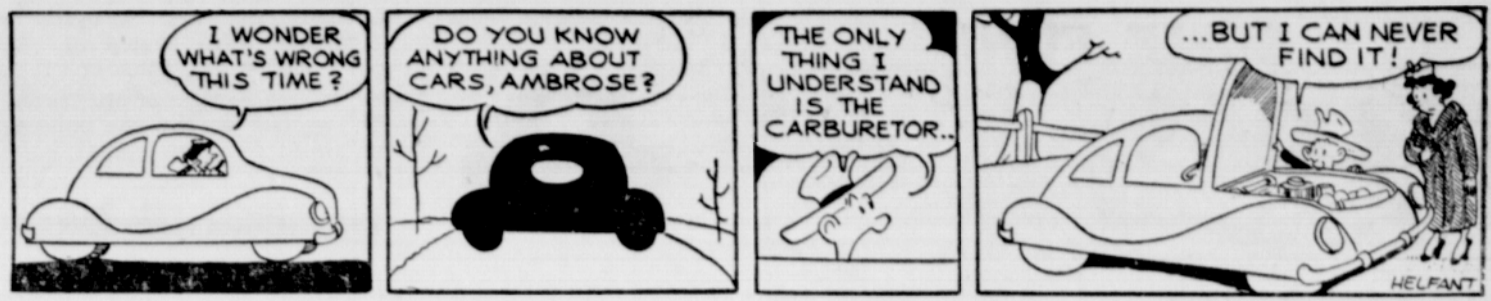
At its next regular meeting in Portland on March 29, the Oregon State Highway Commission will receive bids on the first unit of the planned development of the Oregon Coast Highway between

Grove; Coquille Valley; Jay Streeter, Coquille; Curry: Virgil Clark, Brookings; Douglas: Earl Ladd, Roseburg; Lincoln: August Stanley, Toledo; Klahanie: Ralph Kindler, Eugene; Siusmiqua: Jack Diehl, Reedsport and Three Sisters: Dr. W. L. Huff, Oakridge.

Bold Beach and Pistol River.

This project 1.5 miles in length between Gold Beach and Hunter Creek calls for widening the existing 20-foot oiled surfacing to provide a 64-foot black top pavement between curbs from Second Street to a point approximately 820 feet south of Eleventh Street, a distance of 0.8 mile. From this point to the southerly city limits of Gold Beach, a distance of 0.38 mile, a normal roadbed section is to be constructed, having a 24-foot black top pavement flanked by 10-foot shoulders, 4 feet of which, adjacent to the pavement will be oiled to prevent infiltration of water at the pavement edges.

Grading work on future alignment will be performed on the next 0.32 mile to remove the large cut at the south end of the project, and 0.16 mile of oiled surfacing will be performed on a temporary connection to carry traffic past this major cut. The existing bridge over Riley Creek will be replaced by a reinforced concrete box culvert. Grading and paving work to improve the parking area in the vicinity of the Union High School along the construction of a new concrete retaining wall at that location is to be performed under the contract. Completion of this project, scheduled for the fall of 1957, will provide an all weather roadway built to the latest standards of design.
