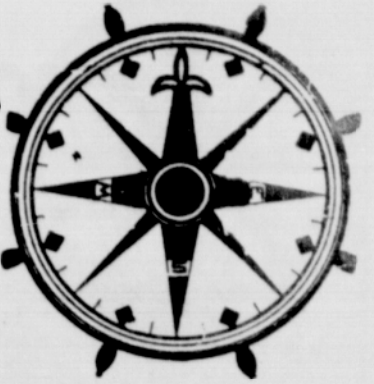

CHETCO JETTY BIDS ARE CALLED



CONGRESSMAN PORTER TO VISIT

Rep. Charles O. Porter will speak in this area on Tuesday, April 23, at 7:30 p. m. according to word received here this week by the Pacific Bulb Growers Association.

The Congressman, recently elected to office, will speak at a dinner open to the public, to be held at the Grange Hall. It will be a no-host, \$1.50 a plate dinner, served by the Grange Home Economic group.

Porter will discuss the Harbor post office situation, and will tell about plans to bring a full time entomologist for the Brookings-Harbor area.

The Congressman will also meet with the timber interests here Wednesday.

The Pacific Bulb Growers are sponsoring the dinner.

50¢ A FOOT WILL PAVE CITY STREETS

Would you pay 50¢ a foot to have the street in front of your house paved?

That is the question of the week being asked by Mayor Fell Campbell. He has hit upon a plan to do just that, but the reaction of the public is needed before the city can go ahead with plans.

Campbell believes that the work can be done for that cost, and forming a special assessment district may be the answer.

At least 75% of the property owners would have to sign for the work.

Mayor Campbell said that the city may send somebody out to get the opinions of the property owners.

Bids were asked Wednesday, April 17, by the Portland District, Corps of Engineers, for construction of two rubble mound jetties at the mouth of the Chetco River near Brookings.

It is estimated the work will require 76,000 tons of jetty stone in place, and 11,200 cubic yards of excavation.

Lt. Col. Francis G. McBride, Acting Portland District Engineer, said the bids would be open at 2 p. m. May 9, in Room 628 Pittock Block, Portland.

Completion time is 180 calendar days which would mean that the jetties might be completed in October.

Bids will be invited under serial CIVENG-35-026-57-218.
