The Mt. Emily Gem and Mineral club have made definite progress in their plans for their big show of the year.

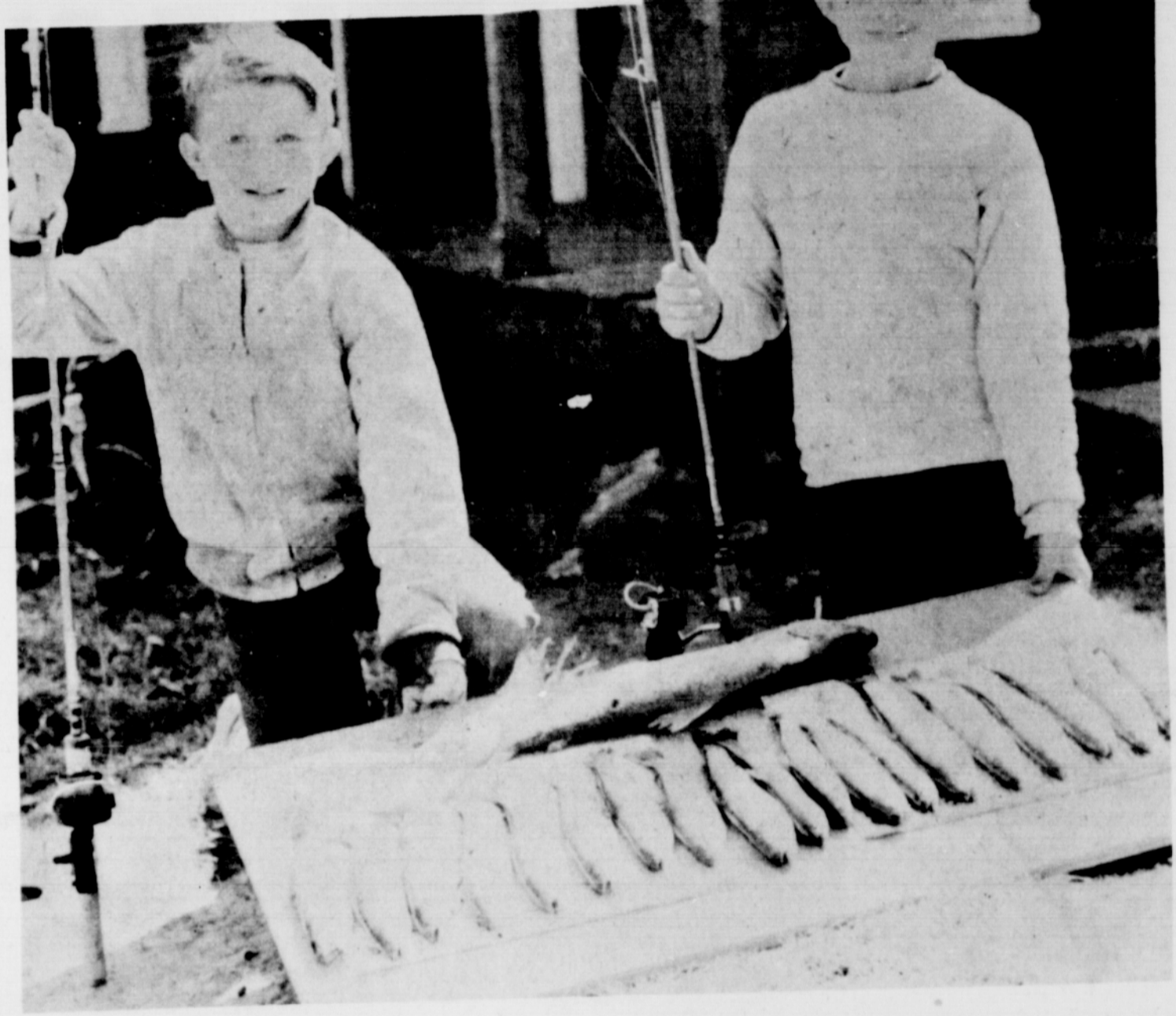
SCHOOL ELECTION NEXT THURSDAY

An election for School district 17-C will be held on Thursday, May 9, for the purpose of exceeding the six percent limitation.

The amount to be levied in excess of the limitation is \$172,951, which is less than the \$184,904 set last year.

The reasons for the increased levy are the rising school costs coupled with a continued rise in enrollment.

KEYES AND PAYNES ARE BURNED OUT IN FIRES

TWO FAMILIES BURNED OUT

Two families were burned out of their homes during the last week.

First, Saturday, the home of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Keyes burned to the ground. Then on Monday morning the home of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Payne, on the North Bank road was burned down.

The causes of both fires could not be determined.

In the Keyes fire, Mr. Keyes was home alone in a wheelchair, having been injured in a woods accident last year. He returned from

a hospital only a short time ago.

Joe Kassa happened to be driving by the place, which is just in the city limits, when he noticed the blaze. He immediately helped Keyes out of the building.

Nobody noticed the fire, and the phone line was dead, so it was sometime before the Fire Department was notified.

Damage was estimated at between seven and eight thousand.

The Paynes are old timers of this area, and have been burned out once before.
