**PIONEER WOMAN DEATH REPORTED**

Mrs. Agnes Johnson Maris, 89, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Mabel Tyler at San Anselmo, Calif., on May 10th, 1057, following a paralytic stroke. Funeral services were held from the Smith River Methodist Church Monday afternoon, the 13th of May, with Rev. James Shepton officiating. the choir sang, "In the Garden." The church was filled with many friends who came to show respect to the one they had known for many years. Surviving are a son, Robert Maris of Smith River; two daughters, Mrs. Catherine Ward of Crescent City, Mrs. Mabel Tyler of San Anselmo, a daughter-in-law, Mrs. Mabel Maris of Smith River. Seven grand children and fifteen great-grand children, and a host of friends. Mrs. Maris was born at Liverpool, England, February 29th, 1868.

At the age of 20 she left England with the Lister family in June, 1888. They landed at New York, traveled over land to San Francisco, then via steamer, and landed at Chetco, Ore., where she lived for several years.

She was married to Joseph Maris in May, 1891, and has made her home for over 66 years in the pioneer Maris home.

Mrs. Maris was a kind neighbor and friend and was loved by all who knew her. She was a member of the church of England, the Episcopalian church. She always took an active part in the Smith River Methodist church and its activities.

Internment was in the family plot beside her husband, who passed away May 10th, 1931. Funeral plans were under the direction of the Hills Funeral Home of San Anselmo.
