Actual construction work on the 2 Brookings jetties will start on about June 1. That was the word from Floyd Somers, who was in Brookings this week laying the groundwork for the \$332,600 project.

Somers was officially awarded the contract for the job this week by the Portland District Corp of Engineers. The two rubble mound jetties are to be completed by Nov. of this year.

The first thing that Somers did in Brookings was to check over the rock quarry again. He has decided to use the rock at Gardner Ridge, up the North Bank Chetco Road, which was furnished by the Army Engineers, through the Brookings Port Commission.

The rock looks as if it will be adequate for the job, Somers said, and the haul to the jetty site will be 8-1/2 miles. Somers reported that they will have to use smaller trucks in order to have a legal haul. He said that they have 4 or 5 Mack trucks of their own.

The firm will have a cat and crane on the jetty site, and will probably start with the South jetty first. The jetties are 20 ft. wide on top, and the South jetty is 1,700 ft. long, with a bend, while the North, or Brookings jetty is 840 ft. long, and heads straight out into the ocean.

The channel between the two structures will be 200 feet, with the opening ending near the two rocks which can be seen in the ocean.

Somers reported that they will have about 40 people working on the project--as many of them local as are qualified. They were looking for an office in Brookings on Wednesday. Somers is not new in the jetty business. His firm constructed the jetty at Bandon, and several in Seattle.
