## BUDGET DOWN IN COUNTY

The Curry County budget will be \$388,776 less than it was a year ago. That was the word in a telephone conversation with Judge Guy Forsyth.

The total county budget, which is subject to change at the final meeting of the budget committee, is now \$1,121,706.

Forsyth said that estimated receipts would be \$997,341, with the balance of the money to come from funds already on hand, so that the tax levy wouldn't be changed.

The budget committee met last Wednesday, and listened to a large group of County people and organizations.

Those in attendance from the Taxpayers League of Brookings were Murray Palmer, Tom McKenzie, and Charles Grayshel. Cecil Watts was also at the meeting.

The Curry County Livestock Assn. was in attendance at the meeting. Elmer Bankus of Brookings is a member of the committee.

Mr. Lewis, the engineer for the jetty construction firm has arrived in Brookings.

ATTEND THE 18TH ANNUAL AZALEA FESTIVAL.

Pets will have a chance to parade Saturday morning, as well as the small fry of the area, in the annual Azalea Festival Pet Parade.

Chairman of the parade, Don Ross, announced that all children, regardless of age are invited to take part in the parade.

The committee in charge of the parade announced four categories in the parade, divided as follows: One: Dogs and Cats, Two: Bicycles, Three: Miscellaneous Pets, and Four: Costumes. A first and second place prize will be given in each category. There will also be a grand prize for the best in the parade.

Separate prizes will be given in the dog and cat division for the following: Best cat; Biggest dog; smallest dog, ugliest dog; and prettiest dog.

The parade will begin at 10 AM Saturday in front of Willys Mobil Station, and will move down Chetco Ave. to Oak St. where it will round the corner and disband. The children are asked to be at the Mobil Station at 9:30 sharp, so that the parade can be lined up.

There will be ice cream bars for all participating in the grand march.

Judges for the parade are Leo Lucas, Albert Joy, and Walter Sadler.
