ARRANGEMENTS - Rules

1. Open to flower lovers of S. Oregon and Northern California.
2. Entries will be registered from 7:30 AM to 10:00 AM Sat., June 8th.
3. No entry will be registered if not in the hall by 10:00 AM.
4. Each exhibitor will furnish own container with owner's name on bottom.
5. Exhibitor to place only one entry in each division.
6. No ribbon will be awarded in any class having less than two entries, unless credit is especially noteworthy.
7. Flower show committee will not be responsible for loss or damage to any container or other property.
8. Containers must be called for at 5 PM Sunday, June 9th.
9. Sweepstake prize will be awarded for the winner of the greatest number of blue ribbons in arrangement classes.

2. Entries will be registered from 7:30 AM to 10:00 AM on Saturday, June 8th.
3. All horticulture specimens must be grown by the exhibitor.
4. Containers for horticulture specimen entries will be furnished.
5. No entries will be registered if not in the hall by 10:00 AM.
6. Blue ribbons will be awarded in each class.
7. No exhibitor will make more than one entry in any listed division or subdivision.
8. Sweepstake prize will be awarded for the winner of the greatest number of blue ribbons in the horticulture classes.
9. Special award to best PEACE ROSE in the show.
