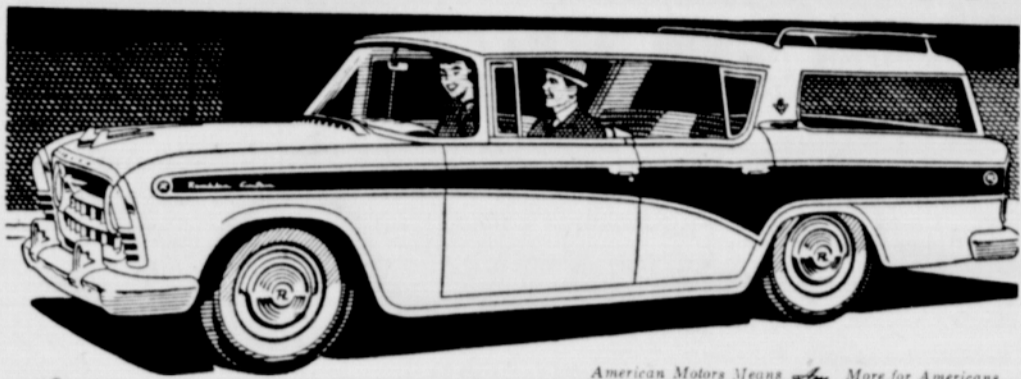

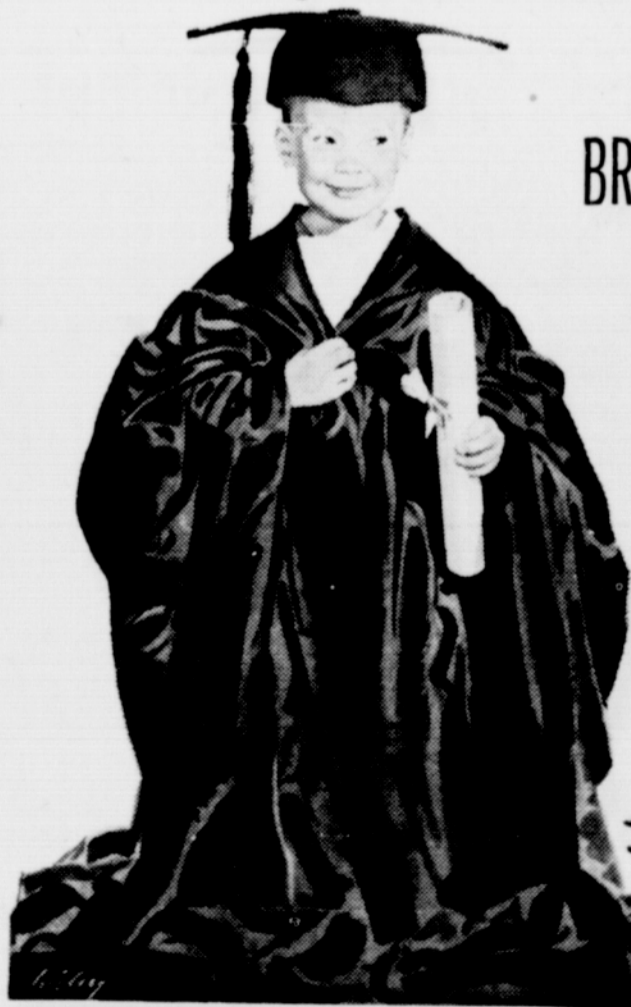

FOR WHAT IT'S WORTH

In my opinion, the toughest job in this great nation of ours at present is that of holding public office, particularly if the official has anything to do with the calling of the tax tune. For somehow or other, the general public has a delusion that their elected representatives lie awake nights trying to invent ways of spending money and to discover new sources for getting it.

Seemingly everyone is convinced that the cost of living will continue its upward trend. Similarly, the average citizen is pretty confident that wages will continue to climb so long as he has anything to do with it. But still he chooses to ignore the fact that government expenses are affected by these same increases.

Since construction costs follow the upward spiral, it is only natural that such undertakings by government are going to become increasingly more expensive. Equipment and machinery which government must purchase, just as industry, must be paid for at an increased price. And the taxpayer foots the bill.

The same is true of labor. The worker toiling for private industry demands that his daily wage shall be such as to enable him to enjoy the standard of living to which he feels he is entitled. Likewise, the citizen who is employed by government believes he has the right to the same standard of living enjoyed by those working for private industry. And these salaries come from taxpayers.

And here is where the rub comes and, peculiarly enough, where the American citizen is most likely to contradict himself. He will shout to the housetops that the laborer is worthy of his hire and that every citizen has the right to enjoy the luxuries as well as the

necessities of life. But let the citizen who is employed by government ask for a similar square deal relative to salary and the resultant scream echoes to the heavens.

For now the shoe is on the other foot. The laborer, who is also a taxpayer, now becomes the employer; and looking at the problem from his new position, he suddenly loses all interest in standards of living for the laborer. In fact, he opposes all wage increases which may affect his own pocketbook.

Faced with the necessity of a solution, the public official cannot be blamed too much if he wonders at times why he ever stuck out his neck to serve.
