

BANK REPORT IS MADE

The United States National bank of Portland in its June 6 statement of condition report showed deposits totaling well over 710 million dollars. Loans and discounts for the state wide system now stand at \$323,551,688.

One of the leading banks in the nation, U.S. National now lists total resources of \$790,440,132.

Since mid-year 1956, U.S. National has completed modern new buildings at six of its branches. In addition, major remodeling projects at other branches have added new services. Customer parking lots were installed at many other locations.

An increase in savings interest rate became effective January 1, raising the rate to two and one-half per cent. At the same time, the bank announced an increased rate of three per cent on three-year certificates of deposit purchased after January 1. Interest on these new certificates is now paid semi-annually at the U.S. National.
