

TIMBER ACCESS ROUTES TO AGNESS UNDER STUDY

Regional Forester Stone announced today that a decision as to final plans of the Forest Service as to the construction of one or more timber access roads to develop the Agness area of the Siskiyou Forest will not be made "within a short time", as seems to have been assumed by organizations and individuals representing adjacent communities.

Mr. Stone said initial surveys and preliminary cost estimates prove the feasibility of road construction over two routes, one a water grade route paralleling the Rogue River to Gold Beach and the other following the general route of the existing low standard road which crosses the Rogue-Coquille divide to join the Coquille River road to Powers. He said further that the Siskiyou Forest's road development plan calls for eventual construction of both roads and that analysis of need shows that neither road alone would satisfy current and future requirements for timber, recreation and other resource utilization.

Mr. Stone said that published statements claiming that one or the other of the contemplated roads were more advantageous from a cost of hauling standpoint were only partially true.

He pointed out that the area to be served by road

development is extremely large and that portions of it would be more economically served by one of the roads and other portions by the other.

Appropriated funds, according to Mr. Stone, are not presently available to make an immediate start on either road. The Forest Service contemplates, he said, that development of the Agness area by access road construction will receive equal consideration with all other urgent access road projects in the state; also, that study will be given to the possibility of construction of portions of both roads by timber purchasers as a condition of timber sale offerings. "It is my hope," Stone said, "that progress in development of both routes can be carried on at about the same pace."
