

COUNTY FAIR NOTES

ANNOUNCE CONVENTION FOR JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES

"Crescent City has been selected as the site for the first ministerial convention of Jehovah's witnesses ever held in this area", Mr. John Kolb, presiding minister of the Crescent City Congregation announced today.

The three-day Circuit Convention will be held in the Main exhibit Building of the Del Norte County Fairgrounds, August 30, 31, and September 1, 1957.

The Convention program gets underway at 7:00 p.m. Friday, August 30, with the keynote address: "Tell the Good News", sounding the theme for the week end assembly.

Highlights of the Convention will be the baptism of newly dedicated ministers at Jedediah State Park Saturday afternoon, and the showing of the color film, "Happiness of the New World Society", at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, August 31st. The public Bible discourse, "Removing the Barriers dividing mankind", to be delivered at 3:00 p.m. Sunday, September 1st will climax the Convention. The speaker, William D. Couch of Pennsylvania, will serve as Convention chairman.

The convention will be devoted to sensible and practical Bible talks and Christian worship.

One thousand delegates are expected to attend from Northern California and Southern Oregon.
