BLOOD DRIVE TO BE HELD HERE IN SEPT

Brookings will have a blood bank drive, even though the city is an "orphan" among cities.

No bloodmobile comes down this far in Oregon, and there is a federal law that prohibits transportation of blood across the state line without a special license.

Those two facts, coupled with the fact that the old Brookings Walking Blood Bank that worked so well in the past in now unworkable due to changes in the routine in Seaside hospital.

routine in Seaside hospital was the reason for a group to sit down and try to figure out an answer.

Attending the meeting were representatives of the Eureka Blood Bank, along with the manager of the Seaside hospital, Mr. Swanson. Local representatives were Frenchie Arrell, Robert Rettke, Dr. Anthony Leschin, and Dr. David Brown.

It was brought out that Brookings was about 60 pints of blood short, and would have to be caught up to enable Brookings people to receive benefits without paying \$30 a pint for blood.

It was tentatively agreed that the Bloodmobile would come to either the state line, or to Smith River, depending upon where facilities could be secured.

It will be Brookings responsibility to find 60 or more donors before the Bloodmobile makes its trip down.

The date for the visit has been tentatively set for Sept. 17, although final plans will be announced in succeeding issues of the Pilot.

Another meeting of the group will be held shortly to formulate complete plans.

BOTANIST HERE
