ENROLLMENT UP IN SCHOOL

RANGERS EXPLORE CRAGGIES

Two local Forest Rangers went the modern way, via helicopter to explore some of the most primitive area anywhere in the country this week.

Rags Ragland, Chetco District Ranger, and Dan Abraham, of the Gold Beach district left Snow Camp look out Tuesday by helicopter for the Big Craggie country which is uninhabited, and seldom visited.

The two men went on a general scouting mission, keeping an eye open for timber, water, and trail or road possibilities. The helicopter, which operates out of Cave Junction, set down at the 101 Cafe last week, to let the Pilot have lunch, causing a few stares.

State Police were investigating the shooting and killing of two cattle on the Bravo place up the Chetco river on Monday. The steers were owned by Archie McVay.

Parts of one of the animals were sliced off.

The Brookings Port Commission, meeting in their regular monthly meeting Tuesday decided that they would request additional funds from the Federal government for the coming fiscal year.

The commission agreed that it would be necessary to wait until they could arrange a meeting with the Army Engineers before they could determine what amount of money would be necessary to dredge out the river, but all were in agreement that it would be needed before full utilization of the river could be developed.

It was agreed to try to call a special meeting as soon as it could be arranged to determine the dredging costs.

There was also discussion on the gravel bar the commission needs to find the state, in effect an exchange for state land along the river below the bridge, which will be used by the commission for a public launching site.

Several prospective sites were studied, and the state seemed satisfied, and will make the exchange providing the deal is right.

It is planned to have a Coast Guard representative down at a meeting in the near future to discuss what markings and lights will be needed on the jetties and in the channel.

It was moved that the Port attorney request the local insurance agents to draw up specifications on liability insurance for the jetties. Currently liability rests with the contractor.
