NOTICE is hereby given that the Oregon State Land Board will receive sealed bids at its office in the State Capitol, Salem, Ore. up to 9:00 o'clock a. m. Tuesday, October 1, 1957 to be opened and read at that hour, for the leasing of 2 separate parcels of tide and overflow land lying between mean high water and mean low water lines along the South bank of the Rogue River, more particularly described hereinafter and referred to as parcels of shoreland, giving, however, to owner or owners of upland abutting or fronting thereon for a period of one week after opening of bids, preference right to lease said shoreland at highest price offered, provided such offer is made in good faith and provided the land board may reject any and all bids.

Said shoreland parcels are located in Curry County, Oregon, and are described as follows:
