It is felt that if a trailer court is installed at this location it will not only detract from the desirability of the residential district but will also decrease the value of the residential property.

It is true we need investment dollars, but there is considerable undeveloped residential property in this area—and any development along this line would certainly be jeopardized if the approach is marred by trailer houses, bath houses, etc.

The property owners have a right to some protection of their investment—every time someone builds a fence or patio or plants a lawn there is money invested—it may not count up so quickly, with only \$50 here and there, but the money is being invested, and the property improved all of the time. It is the permanent residents who will make the town a decent place to live and maintain a desirable standard of living, and I feel it is our duty to voice our opinions when something arises which we feel will jeopardize the attractiveness of the town, as well as our neighborhood, therefore the "yakking".

I doubt if there is a residential area in the city who would welcome a trailer court at its entrance, and I am sure any other neighborhood would be just as concerned if it were happening to them.
