## OBIE NEWTON DEATH TOLD

Obie H. Newton passed away suddenly at his home south of Harbor Sunday afternoon, Sept. 29th.

Obie, son of Hardy S. and Fannie Jones Newton was born at Gainesville, Texas on Feb. 27 1884, coming to Oregon with the family in a covered wagon over the Old Oregon Trail.

His boyhood days were spent in the Klamath Falls country, where his father was engaged in stock raising.

He was graduated from the Ashland Normal and attended Oregon University.

Nine years were spent in the Philippines, in the Constabulary Service of the U.S. and he was retired as a Captain.

Since returning to the U.S. he was engaged in potato farming at Tulelake, Calif. and Langel Valley country of Klamath county until 1944 when he came to Harbor where he has grown Easter Lilies.

He is survived by four sisters: Dovie Colson of Klamath Falls, Ethel Sherman of Los Altos, Jessie Judkins of Harbor, and Ruby Harvey of Harbor; Three brothers, Almo Newton, Harbor, Tommy Newton, of Tulelake, and James Newton of Mt. Shasta, Calif. and a number of nephews and nieces.

Funeral services were conducted from the Presbyterian church Wednesday, with Rev. Kenneth Killin officiating.

Interment was in the James Ward Memorial Cemetery, under the auspices of Wiers Mortuary.

## CHETCO SURVEY MAY BE MADE

### "Laff-O-Rama" Director Arrives Here

Miss Betty Baumgarten arrived here Tuesday to direct and coordinate the activities of the local citizens who will participate in the various activities in connection with "Laff-O-Rama," an area presentation which will be staged on Thursday and Friday October 17-18, in the high school auditorium, for the benefit of the new American Legion home.

Miss Baumgarten who is working under the sponsorship of the American Legion Post 138 of Brookings come highly recommended.

She has completed special training on the method of producing "area presentations", which is a technique made famous by such shows as "Icecapades," and "Skating Vanities." This new type



of community entertainment, billed as "Your Home Town Circus" presents the acts and performers using the entire sweep and scope of the arena floor, as it is too large and spectacular to be produced upon an ordinary stage.

Miss Baumgarten met with Montie Leonard and others who are members of the Legion to set in motion plans for the various phases of the promotion.

### MAY MAKE SURVEY OF RIVER POSSIBILITIES

The Brookings Port Commission will consider the possibility of making a survey on the potentials of the Chetco river, and its banks.

Rather than to start development on a helter-skelter basis, which may be regretted later, the Commission thought that it would be much better to present an over-all development plan to the public.

A letter was written to the Stanford Research group who specializes in jobs of this sort, to determine what the cash outlay would be to give the river and its shores a concrete plan.

At least one private individual has indicated that he would put in a good size hunk of money to help finance the research work.

The survey would include such items as barging, channel, commercial fishing, and public access to the river.

It was understood that the Army Engineers are waiting for the local Commission to show that they intend to do something, before the Engineers approve further work on the project, such as dredging.

The jetty work is apparently right on schedule now, with a November completion date. The contractors have put in some night work in recent weeks in an effort to maintain their schedule.

They must add a couple of hundred feet to each jetty. The recent storm showed that they were well constructed, only the roadbed was lost, and that was expected.

### PLACE CHANGED ON FLYING CLUB FILM

The Chetco Flying Club will meet at the high school, in room five, rather than at the Brookings Fire Station as previously announced.

The meeting and film are open to the public. It will start at 7:30 Monday night, Oct. 7.

In addition to a film on Flying safety, there will be a film on eliminating the 180 degree turn.

## CHETCO RUN GETS OFF TO SLOW START

There were a lot of boats out Sunday, but because of the slow fishing, Monday and Tuesday the river was all but empty.

Wednesday about three or four boats were in the river, and another 15 or 20 people were fishing at the channel entrance.
