RETURN FROM TRIP

Flossie and Al Buchanan returned this week from a trip to Tonopah, Nevada.

The Brookings City Council made another round on the possibility of "just getting a start" on the street paving program for Brookings next summer.

The discussion was participated by the Planning Commission recommendation that the city initiate street surfacing, at the cost to the property owners of 30¢ a front foot. It was recommended that the city crew do the work, and the 30¢ figure would pay for the materials.

The planning commission also recommended that it be done as much as possible on a volunteer basis.

The project would include a heavy oil surface, which would not be permanent, but would hold down dust, and would be a base for future work.

It was discussed that it would be the only plan within the financial reach of the people at this time.

It was the general opinion of the council that "we've got to make a start".

The reaction of the council was that there would be difficulties in making the paving on a volunteer basis, and said that it probably would have to be done on a special assessment district basis.

The planning commissions idea was to get the people interested down to sign up, so that it could be determined who wants paving.

There was also the question of which streets are ready for the work.

In conclusion the council named a committee, consisting of three councilmen, and two planning commission members to work with Bill Spencer to try to determine what streets would be worked on.

TO DISCUSS ROAD TO GRANTS PASS

The Brookings-Harbor Chamber of Commerce board of directors will hold a special session this Thursday night to discuss the possibilities of a road to Grants Pass through Oregon.

Marshall Dana, former editorial writer of the Oregonian, and now assistant to the president of the U.S. National Bank has been invited to present his views on the subject.

Several other groups, the city council, the port commission, and all others interested are invited to attend.

The council also talked to R.H. Erichsen, of Coos Bay, a consulting engineer, who said that he would like to be retained by the city to do their engineering work.

Erichsen is already consulting engineer for Myrtle Point, Gold Beach, Reedsport, Eastside and Bandon.

He explained his fees, and his staff, and what his experiences were.

The council agreed to consider the matter.

Again the matter of the 8 or 10 homes which, according to Fire Chief Val Mendenhall, have had fireplaces, came up for discussion.

It was reported that the insurance companies were accepting the work. It was agreed to give them another look by a party of three before taking any further action.

There was some talk on the Sewer Treatment Plant bond issue and how many mills it would cost the taxpayers.

Erichsen said that the city would have to bond for the full amount of work to be done, which would be around \$140,000, and then not issue the warrants on the complete amount if the federal government will go along for one third of the cost as anticipated.

Nothing could be done on the bond issue until a more complete cost study picture is obtained.

The Library committee reported plans for the landscaping are complete, but they need funds to start on the project.

The council pointed out that there was no money budgeted for the work, and consequently would have to be put off until such time.
