PAUL REVERE RIDES AGAIN

Patriotic Observance in Which City of Boston and Other Communities Take Part.

In a patriotic observance the city of Boston, with the co-operation of several adjoining communities, in accordance with an annual custom, commemorated the famous midnight ride of Paul Revere. The celebration in Boston began the night before April 19. "Patriot's Day," when a descendant of one of Paul Revere's contemporaries hung a lantern in the belfry of the Old North church, just as was done on the night of April 18, 1775. Then on April 19 the ride to Lexington was repeated by a man on horseback, dressed to resemble Paul Revere, and who followed the route taken on that historic occasion. The messenger departed from the quaint little house in North Square where the real Paul Revere plied his trade as a silversmith, the crowded Italian quarter the old house stands undisturbed among the modern buildings that rise above it on all sides.

In spite of the momentous consequences of that 18-mile ride in the Eighteenth century, comparatively few persons saw Paul Revere as he raced from hamlet to hamlet to spread the alarm of the British advance. The population, of course, was small; and besides, the only thing which the lightest sleepers could have seen as they tumbled from bed was a flurry of dust and a dim figure disappearing in the dawn.

COMBINED FORMS OF BELIEF

Christian, Greek and Oriental Teachings Mixed in One Formula by the Ancient Gnostics.

The Gnostics were a group of ancient heretics, famous from the rise of Christianity. They did not constitute a distinct sect, but were more nearly a complication of many sects. The Gnostics claimed to interpret the teachings of Christianity in a philosophic manner, and in so doing combined Oriental theology and Greek philosophy with its doctrines. The principal tenets of the Gnostics were as follows:

Belief in one eternal God. Countless generations of aeons emanating from God, and representative of the divine attributes.

The essential evil of material substance.

The existence of a demiurge (inferior god) by whom the world was governed. He was the Old Testament God, and hostile to the Supreme Being.

These tenets were revived in Spain by the "Priscillianists" in the Fourth century.

7,000 Pigeon Racers.

To show the interest which has been aroused in pigeon racing, there are now more than 7,000 members of racing pigeon clubs in this country who run their lofts against their rivals regularly, says Nature Magazine of Washington, D. C. Despite unfavorable weather conditions, the birds will make rapid progress toward their home goals after they start in a race. When the wind is high and strong, they fly very close to the ground, where they are best sheltered from the elements.

Ornithological Quest.

The biological survey and the Bishop museum of Honolulu are sending a scientific expedition to explore the Hawaiian islands national bird reservation. The company will make collections and gather information concerning the bird life of the reservation, which consists of a dozen or more islands, reefs and shoals stretching westward from the Hawaiian archipelago proper for more than 2,500 miles toward Japan. The Navy department is to furnish a vessel for the use of the party.

Source of Thorianite.

It is said that the mineral thorianite, now largely used in the manufacture of mantles for incandescent gas lamps, is at present not known to occur elsewhere than in the island of Ceylon. Its discovery was due to the operations of the Ceylon mineral survey. It is exported to Europe and the United States.

HUMAN SACRIFICES IN ASSAM

Attempt by Government to Abolish a
Common Evil Has Met With
Much Opposition.

The report on the efforts made by the government to suppress slavery and human sacrifice in the Nago hills shows, according to Mr. Clayton, who was recently commissioner on the northeastern frontier of Burma, that last year there were 271 slaves in Ekamptu, as compared with 373 in the previous year. The reduction was mainly due to release of slaves, writes Henri Rickard in the Cincinnati Enquirer. Several cases have been reported of Indians being enticed by Nagas to work as blacksmiths, and being seized and sold into slavery in the Hukong valley, but only seven Indian slaves were found, of whom three were released, the others being content with their lot. An Indian man and a girl set apart for sacrifice by the Nagas were released.

The investigations showed that human sacrifice was much more common in the Naga hills than was supposed, there being no fewer than six boys and ten girls annually, and in plentiful years twenty boys and thirty girls kidnapped from Assam. These were the commonest victims. The report states that an attempt to rescue slaves from sacrifice creates a vicious circle, in which a fantastic price is charged for a victim hoarded for a bigger and more expensive sacrifice. The report comes to the conclusion that the only solution appears to be direct government administration of the tracts where these hideous practices prevail.
