State Highway Commissioner Babcock and Chief Engineer Mullen of the state of Minnesota spent some time at Salem last week conferring with officials of the state highway department.

For the second time within a week the power line from Pendleton which serves Pilot Rock was put out of commission Thursday when wild geese flew against the line and caused a short circuit.

It was announced at Salem that a bill would be introduced in the legislature at its next session providing that all peace officers, on salary, shall come under the workmen's compensation law.

Funds with which to establish permanent airplane fire patrol in Oregon forests will be sought at the December session of congress, it was announced by Colonel Greeley, chief of the forest service.

On account of the inclement weather the last two or three weeks the work on the new highway between Niagara and Halls being done by the United States Fidelity & Guarantee company has been discontinued.

Thomas Cornelius, for the last two years in charge of the Oregon state penitentiary farm at Salem, has resigned his position, to become effective December 1. His successor has not yet been appointed.

The contract for completion of cruising timber in Tillamook county by M. G. Nease was signed by Nease and the county court last week. The contract specifies not less than 100,000 acres to be cruised at 25 cents an acre, the cruise to be completed before March 31, 1926.

Figures just released by the forest service showed that in 1923 Oregon was second in lumber production with a total of 3,966,083,000 feet. The only other state ahead was Washington, with 6,677,656,000 feet. Production in Oregon increased 31 per cent over the previous year.

The Oregon supreme court, in an opinion handed down has reversed Judge Campbell of the Clackamas county circuit court in the case involving Samuel Director, accused of larceny in connection with the alleged burning of his store at Oregon City. A retrial will be held.
