Medford growers and shippers are also "following through" this year by keeping Henry Hartman, pomologist on leave from Oregon State college, in the eastern market centers to make sure the fruit reaches consumers

in the best shape possible.

The amount of swelling determines the amount of water required in cooking cereals. Thus rolled oats, which swell about twice, require twice as much water as cereal. Coarsely ground or whole cereals swell about four times, and finely ground and refined cereals swell from five to six times.

A celebration in recognition of Oregon's third national 4-H club winner is being planned by the city of Eugene in honor of Miss Lois Bailey, Lane county girl who has just won the Moses trophy as the most outstanding club girl and leader in the United States. The club division of the Oregon State College extension service is cooperating in arranging the celebration for December 21.
