Betty Harris Passes Away

Little Betty Harris, seven year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Harris, passed away Sunday at a Portland hospital, where she was taken after a brief illness in Willamina.

Some time ago, she was taken ill with a cold and was kept out of school, for a time but after careful nursing, she became better and again entered school. In a little time, however, her cold became worse with resultant sore throat. Her mother did everything for her that could be done, but her condition became worse. The parents, becoming worried over her condition, took her to Portland where they learned, after physicians had examined her, that she was suffering from diphtheria. Everything that could possibly be done, was done to save her life, but she being somewhat delicate, could not overcome the disease, and soon passed away. The remains of the little body were laid to rest in the cemetery at Oregon City, Monday.

The sympathy of the entire community goes out to these parents in their sad bereavement. The nature of the case was such, also, that these parents need our truest consideration. While the fact that the little one became ill while attending school, and because of the dread that is

held by practically all persons of this disease, considerable excitement has been caused in town, but the parents should not be held responsible in any way. They did just what any other parents would have done under the circumstances. They did not know what the cause of the sickness was until the little one was taken to Portland for treatment. In our report from the State Health officer for last week, not a case of diphtheria was listed in the state. However, now there are a considerable number of cases. Everything has been done by health officers to guard Willamina children from further outbreaks, and it is not probable that we will have other cases but everyone should be careful.

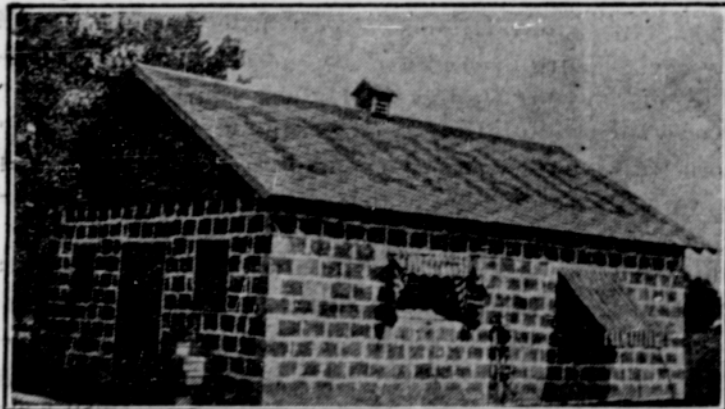
