Scot Saw Possibilities of Under-Water Craft

The story of the evolution of under-water boats seldom makes mention of a Scotsman's idea which, had it been translated into practical form, might have given Scotland the honor of producing the first submarine, says a writer in the Weekly Scotsman. That distinction falls, actually, to a Dutchman, Cornelius Van Drebbell, who constructed a submersible craft which was tried out on the River Thames, near London, in the early part of 1624, but did not prove much of a success.

It is a remarkable fact that nearly thirty years before Van Drebbell's invention John Napier of Merchiston, the celebrated inventor of logarithms, announced that he had in mind a similar innovation in methods of navigation. In a pamphlet which he published in Edinburgh on June 7, 1596, Napier referred to "devices of sailing under the waters," which he "hopes to perform." He does not appear to have attempted to realize that hope, however, and no more is heard of the idea of a Scottish submarine which, we may take it, would have given the Firth of Forth an additional measure of fame.

Great East Indian Firm

"Tata Sons, Ltd.," is an Indian house, founded by the late Jamsetji N. Tata, a Parsi merchant and industrial pioneer. The headquarters are in Bombay, and the combined capital of their undertakings is estimated at \$250,000,000, providing employment for nearly 250,000 people.

FAMILY NATION'S FOUNDATION

Even though we of the United States have a greater divorce rate than any country in the world there are those among us who are endeavoring to make looser the already weakened bonds of marriage. The divorce rate of the people of our church is only one-fifth as great as that of people throughout the country.

In this age when there is so much dissension among religious leaders and so many different theories, it is a joy to find that our church has followed a plan for more than one hundred years and that will also work out well in the future. We have the first Sunday of every month as a fast day and we find it to be beneficial not only physically, as it gives the internal organs a rest, but it also helps to exercise control over the impulses of the body. Fasting gives us a feeling of sympathy for the poor, as we are better able to appreciate the way they too often are forced to feel. The money that is saved by doing without these two meals is given to the poor in such a manner that the recipients of the money are in no way humiliated.

WARFARE ON CRIMINALITY

CRIMINAL tendencies, like tuberculosis or cancer, are easier to cure or control when discovered early. It will be necessary to go down into the plague spots—the breeding places where the scourge germinates—if we would rid our land of the malignancy of crime. Intense sociological and psychological preventives in homes, kindergartens and schools to discover the potential long before the overt act is committed, doubtless will be one of the most potent remedies for crime in coming generations.

We are in a transition era and when we find ourselves psychology will have a prominent place in the solution of crime. At present we are compelled to depend upon our protective agencies.

Punishment never will rid society of the criminal. Even if the prisons attain the maximum of efficiency, they will be unable to salvage, rehabilitate and make law-abiding citizens of more than 70 per cent of those committed. The ablest police department can only check, not eliminate, crime. Whatever deterring effect there is in punishment is best realized when punishment is swift and certain.

There are just three objectives in criminal jurisprudence—the protection of society, deterring from crime and reformation or cure of the criminal. The first objective is supreme. If we accomplish by any means whatsoever the last two, we will realize to that extent the first, namely, the protection of society.

We cannot measure all criminals by the same standard. Neither are the demands of society met by the same treatment in all cases. All criminals are different personalities, and scientific handling demands that they be given individual treatment.
