

Bargain Days on S. P.

May Day will be "Dollar Day" in rail transportation circles this year, it was made known this week with announcement by the Southern Pacific company of plans for another offering of its famous "cent-a-mile" excursions.

Arrangements have just been completed by the company for a four-day sale of its low-cost round trips, according to V. E. Fraker, local agent for the company. The excursions will be operated from April 28 to May 1, inclusive, with return limit of May 10 he said.

The territory to be included in the new "cent-a-mile" offer will cover Southern Pacific's lines from San Francisco to Ogden and Salt Lake City, and from Portland to El Paso, it was stated.

Days and Nights on Moon

All parts of the moon are bathed in direct sunshine at some time or other, and as each part is thus exposed for nearly two weeks at a time the surface temperatures must get very hot at such times. Astronomers have computed that when the sun is shining the surface lava rises to a temperature of about 216 degrees Fahrenheit, that is, several degrees higher than the temperature of boiling water. On the other hand, temperatures as low as 243 degrees below zero Fahrenheit are believed to occur in that part of the moon turned away temporarily from the sun. Because of the absence of an atmosphere there are great contrasts of temperature from time to time and from place to place.
