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Washington Current Comments

The Senate has before it a resolution to create a committee to confer with similar committees from the House and White House, in an effort to draft a bill which will result in lessening the expenditures of the federal government. Several state governors urge a tariff on copper. Relief for southern wind-storm sufferers get attention. Treaties with Poland and Norway, of minor importance, are approved. A Senator brings to notice the curious fact that in a town in the state of Washington business is being carried on by means of wooden money, the banks having failed. The appropriation bill for the department of Interior, with a ten per cent cut, has been reported from committee. It is protested on the floor that the tax bill should not be complicated by tariff provisions. Those who write to their Senators about the tax bill and get a printed reply, should not feel hurt; a Senator says that he has received so many communications that he cannot answer them, and it is proposed to relieve the perspiring stenographers by passing a resolution to the effect that the Senate will endeavor to pass a tax bill that will be fair to everyone.

The House, after careful consideration, accepts a Democratic member whose seat was contested. The wrestle with the appropriation measure continues. The annually dwindling Civil War pension measure has been passed. The nine hundred and eighty-five thousand dollar bill for the support of the independent offices, such as veteran's affairs, the Interstate Commerce Commission, etc., goes through.

A. C. Lindholm, Chairman of the Board of Parole of Minnesota, probably thought that he was writing simply about prison management, in an article that he released a while ago. He did not know, or was to modest to assume, that he was a mouth piece for the whole troubled world. "All this" says Mr. Lindholm, "would be easy, were man's mind and heart an open book; if those intangible values that cannot be seen by the eye, or discovered by investigation, were revealed. They are matters that only the Infinite knows, yet over which finite beings must judge.

One hardly dares comment on the outcome of the Lindbergh affair. If the optimists are right, a gloomy paragraph is likely to be out of order any day. If the pessimists are right, there is good reason to think that Col. Lindbergh has in store no larger comfort than that for which David hoped. When the King of Israel had to part with a beloved child, he said: "I shall go to him, but he will not return to me."

War leaves a train of complications that survive the combatants and the hatred that war engenders. Congress has before it a resolution authorizing the states to sue for two hundred million dollars in taxes said to have been unlawfully collected by the federal authorities in the days of 1861-65.

A resolution has been introduced in the house of Representatives which will enable a trial to proceed if a juror falls sick, or dies. Newspapers do not suspend publication when a pressman, or even the editor, falls by the wayside; and the death of a store clerk is followed by no disturbance more marked than a collection of wreaths of flowers. The courts, alone, do not seem inclined to follow the rule that "The workman perish, but the work goes on."

The Governor of New Mexico says that the basic problem of the farmer is distribution. It is the basic problem of every producer. Years ago Henry George remarked that there could be no lack of a market so long as anybody was cold or hungry. With farm products in storage because they cannot be sold, and with the masses in need of what the farm has to offer, the experts in distribution have an opportunity to show the fertility of their wits and brains.
