Best for Baby



NOT "How much trouble is it?" but "Is it best for baby?" is the question paramount to mothers. Generations of tireless mothers have strained and specially prepared endless food for generations of babies, and now that baby food is pureed and scientifically prepared in cans, mothers everywhere, are asking their physicians—which is best for baby?

Dr. Walter H. Eddy, of Columbia University, recently told mothers this in "Good Housekeeping Magazine":

"When vegetables are cooked and pureed in the home, the process usually leads to a considerable destruction of vitamin C, owing to the access of air during the process. The canned pureed vegetables are more valuable than

the home-prepared, in proportion as care is taken during the pureeing process to exclude air. Most manufacturers marketing these products pay special attention to this and, consequently, I heartily approve of these products."

The manufacturers of these foods not only maintain testing laboratories, but one of them has installed a testing kitchen which is planned as a model kitchen, suitable for the average home, and duplicating average home cooking conditions. Here a trained specialist devotes her time to questions of nutrition pertaining to infant feeding. No vegetables canned are subjected to a more intensive study than these vegetables prepared for "baby," but always consult baby's doctor first.
