EMPLOYMENT FOR STUDENTS

A fund of \$600, made available to the University of Oregon from money collected last year for the state-wide relief fund, will be used to finance projects here which will provide employment for a number of students, it was announced today by Earl M. Pellett, executive secretary of the university. In every case the work will be allotted to students who must earn money with which to pay registration fee next term, it was stated. Students will be given only enough work to earn the amount they actually need for fees, so that as many students as possible may be aided, it is pointed out.

Last year each member of the faculty and staff here contributed a day's pay each month to the governor's relief fund. The unexpended balance now on hand has been allotted back to the various institutions to provide jobs for students.
