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## Sunday is Father's Day

Sunday, June 16, is the silver anniversary of Father's Day. Father's Day was first broached by Mrs. John B. Dodd of Spokane, in 1910, and was the butt of much merriment, not being generally observed, but in 1914 congress passed a resolution setting aside the first Sunday in June as a day on which to honor the daddies of the nation collectively. Still efforts to promote Father's Day lagged until 1920, when the day was changed from the first to the third Sunday in June and became of really national import. Observance has since grown rapidly and has spread to foreign countries.

## LUMBER STRIKE COST NORTHWEST MILLIONS

In the fourth week of the West Coast lumber strike, mills reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen's association produced 24,550,511 feet of lumber, slightly less than 10% of capacity. This compares with 30.5% of capacity in the first quarter of 1935, and with 19.8% in 1932, when the depression was at its worst.

The new business reported to the association for the week ending June 1 was less by 16 3/4% than in the previous week. Reports from the National Lumber Manufacturers' association at Washington, D. C., covering all regions, show that on June 1 the national lumber industry had reported for three consecutive weeks a decline in production, shipments and orders. This indicates that the early summer spurt in demand for lumber probably has passed.

While this decrease is shown for the lumber industry in the United States as a whole, the Southern Pine association reported from New Orleans to the National association an increase in production of 17% and in orders of 89%, compared with the same week a year ago. Advances from market areas coming to West Coast lumbermen are to the effect that the large increases registered by Southern yellow pine mills during May were caused primarily by the strike in the West Coast lumber industry. Buyers are having their immediate needs filled mostly in southern yellow pine, with the result that mill prices in the south have increased \$2.00 to \$4.00 per thousand.

The total loss to the industry, its employees, and West Coast lumber communities caused by the strike is estimated by the association to be between four and five million dollars during the month of May. This is the direct loss in lumber and logging and does not include other forest industry products.

The strike has been effective throughout western Washington and along the Columbia river in both Oregon and Washington. Mills in the Willamette valley and along the Oregon coast continued to operate during the month.

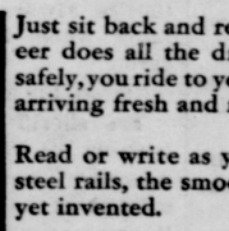

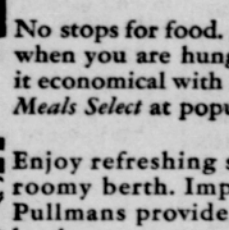

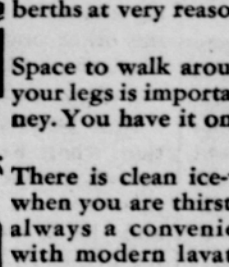
