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Why Living is High

Everyone is complaining about the increase in the cost of food; the raise in living costs having advanced much faster than wages. The AAA has raised the price of some farm products, but has it raised them enough to offset the increase in price on the things the farmer must buy? We hardly think so; but it has made a big change in the United States food supply, as evidenced by the following figures from a recent issue of the "United States News":

In 1933 the United States had an exportable surplus of approximately 58 million bushels of wheat, in 1935 we imported 28 million bushels.

Figures as to other principal farm products:

Corn: exportable surplus in 1933, 144 million bushels; imports in 1935, 34 million bushels.

Rye: exportable surplus in 1933, 1,870,000 bushels; imports in 1935, nearly 12 million bushels.

Lard: exportable surplus in 1933, 6175 million pounds; imported in 1935, 12 million pounds.

Pork: exportable surplus, 300 million pounds in 1933; imported in 1935, six million pounds.

Of course the importation of these food stuffs has given other nations money with which to buy United States steel products, automobiles and machinery manufactured in the East; but that does not help the average family of the agricultural and timber sections of the country to balance its budget. A "new deal" for the steel trust and auto manufacturers, but a "raw deal" for the rest of us.

It is suggested that the highway between Willamina and Valley Junction be named the "Mae West" highway. At least it has recently proved dangerous to the man who tried to go straight, and equally disastrous to the driver who attempted to hug the curves too tight.

MAKE LARGE CHEESE

On Wednesday the writer was in Sheridan and called at the Farmers Union Cooperative Creamery. They handle the bulk of the milk and cream from the dairy farms of this vicinity, and are making both butter and cheese, as well as running an evaporator and producing dried milk.

We visited their cheese factory, where they had just completed making a large loaf cheese which weighed 700 pounds. It was pressed in a specially constructed mold and measures 42x22x18 inches, which we think is "some cheese." Another cheese of the same size was in the mold and still another will be made for the same order. The three cheeses will have a combined weight of 2,100 pounds and will require 19,100 pounds of milk for their manufacture.

The same people who ordered these mammoth cheeses also ordered 2,000 two-pound loaves to be sold while the large ones are on exhibition. It will take some time for the large loaves to "cure," so they will probably not be cut until after the holidays.

The products of the Farmers Co-op. are getting to be well known and their market is limited only by the amount of milk which their patrons are able to furnish, and new dairies are being signed up every week.

From the Office of the County Agent

All committee groups have met to make preliminary plans for the Agricultural Economic Conference to be held in McMinnville January 24 and 25. Committee members sense the importance of such a conference, and indications are that a major part of the farmers from every section of the county will attend.

The Agricultural Economics group discussed the conditions of Willamette Valley and Yamhill county farms. In most cases they decided that the farm acreage and cultivated land was too small to provide the best of living conditions. The group did not encourage part-time farming for city workers, unless a man had at least 50% of his time to devote to farming.

4-H club leaders and members are holding an "achievement" program at Fairview school, on 3-mile lane, November 22 at 8:00 p. m. State and county scholarship winners will be awarded cards in recognition of this honor. Club members are encouraged to attend; also others interested in 4-H work. A short program and business meeting will be held prior to the luncheon.

The final sign-up date for the 1936 39 wheat campaign has been set as November 25th. Farmers who plan to sign up, whether or not they are former signers, are urged to call at the county agent's office and fill out applications for contracts.
