What Will They Do Next?

After setting an arbitrary price on milk in the state of Oregon, regardless of local conditions and cost of production in the various localities, we are informed that the state Milk Control Board are now interfering with the means that some dairies are using to advertise their products. We have not heard of the board stopping the use of the "blown in the bottle" advertising, but because some of the smaller dairies are using a printed label placed over the top of the bottle to let the buyer know who bottled the product, we are informed that the board has notified them that they must charge an extra cent for milk delivered with this extra label.

The large dairies in the cities may use all the circulars and newspaper advertising they wish, without charging the bill directly to the consumer, but the small dairy cannot put a label on their bottle without making the consumer pay for this form of advertising.

The board may be trying to earn their money or make some excuse for their existence, but they are certainly making it hard on the dairymen, without serving any worthwhile purpose. How long will the people of this state stand for this commission-interference in legitimate trade? The dairymen are forced to submit to these unjust rules, because the commission can always find an excuse to revoke the individual's license if he objects to any of their regulations.

TAXING PIN-BALL GAMES

U. of O. — (Special) — Pin and ball machines, in which the hopeful contestant puts in a five-cent piece and then shoots out from one to ten marbles into score places on a board, are doing their bit—and in some places quite a bit—toward support of city governments in Oregon, figures compiled by the Bureau of Municipal Research of the University of Oregon and the League of Oregon Cities show.

Although taxing these machines has proved to be a substantial source of revenue for many cities, a large majority of municipalities have not taken advantage of this opportunity, the survey reveals. Only about one-third of the 110 cities answering the bureau's questionnaire license the pin-ball machines, while about 10 percent prohibit them. The old type slot machine is barred in 29 of the cities, while 16 license them.

OREGON SEED IN DEMAND

The severe and continued drought in the middle west has had marked effect on future field seed supplies, reports E. S. Jackson, extension agronomist at Oregon State college. In many cases, alfalfa, clover and grass seed crops in the drought area have been practically ruined which will doubtless have its effect on prices for the 1936 supplies.

Oregon raises a large tonnage of field seeds now, and will probably be called upon to supply a larger proportion of the country's needs than usual. Seed crops of which Oregon has a virtual monopoly, such as bent grass, are not expected to be affected as much, except as demand for such seed is increased by the shortage of other types.

Many Oregon farmers who had not contemplated harvesting some crops for seed have now decided to allow them to mature for this purpose, says Jackson.

U. S. SEED QUARANTINE

The request of Oregon seed producers to have a plant quarantine placed against imported vetch and certain types of pea seed has been approved by Washington authorities and such a quarantine went into effect on August 1.

The quarantine order, issued by the secretary of Agriculture, says that it has been determined that certain imported vetch and pea seeds are frequently infested with one or more species of seed weevils, particularly the vetch bruchid. Heretofore no inspection has been made of these seeds for this pest, but from now on entry of such seeds will have to meet rigid inspection requirements.

The highly destructive vetch bruchid has already become established in certain eastern and south Atlantic states where it is said to threaten the eastern vetch industry. Effective control of this pest has not been worked out and every effort is being made to keep it from spreading to the western states.
