The City Water Department is a partially self-sustaining bureau, from which approximately the sum of \$2,500.00 is derived each year from water rentals, all of which is required to pay for the services of the Water Commissioner, interest on city water bonds, and to retire the principal sum of said water bonds, serially each year, and to keep in repair said water system and to make betterments thereto.
