Democratic Candidates Will Meet Here October 8th; Republicans To Gather October 15

The Willamina Retail Merchants' association have planned for two political rally days to be held here on Saturday, October 8, and Saturday, October 15. Various democratic candidates, both county and state, will be here October 8, and each will give a three minute talk to state his platform, or whatever he chooses to talk about. Republican candidates will be given the same privileges on Saturday, October 15.

"Birth of a Baby" at Hi-Way Theatre September 26-27

"The Birth of a Baby," undoubtedly the most widely publicized film ever made in America, and the most useful film ever made in any country, opens at the Hi-Way Theatre in Sheridan Sept. 26 and runs until September 27.

Produced by the American Committee on Maternal Welfare—which derives its membership from the leading groups of physicians and health departments of the country—this picture presents, with all the impersonal exactitude of science, the history of a pregnancy and birth—presents it impersonally, but so tenderly and discreetly that no intelligent adult could possibly be offended and no adolescent moved to any emotion except awe.

There is enough narrative to hold the facts in proper sequence, for we follow that most momentous chapter in the life of a young wife—her first pregnancy, and we learn with her what an intelligent doctor imparts to an expectant mother, allaying her fears, instructing her conduct, until—within full view of the camera—the child is actually born.

The public value of this film in combating ignorance and fear is simply incalculable. For a reviewer not to urge any and all to see it would be to do something less than both his artistic and public duty. For in a very special sense, it is true here that "beauty is truth, truth beauty!"

New Pane of Stamps Now Available From T.B. Assn.

Honoring four men who have contributed much to the fight on tuberculosis, a pane of stamps, designed primarily for collectors, now is available at the headquarters of the Oregon Tuberculosis association in the Woodlark building, Portland and the various county public health associations of the state.

As a special inducement to collectors, officers of the National Tuberculosis association have announced that only 25,000 copies of the pane have been printed in the whole United States and that there will be no reprints. The panes sell for 25 cents each and may be bought by mail or directly from the county or state headquarters.

STUDENTS RETURN TO SCHOOL FOLLOWING SUMMER VACATION

High School Boys	Increase of 11 Pupils Over Last Year; Grade School 12 Less This Year
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After having been stilled during the summer months, the school bell at Willamina rang Monday morning summoning students from the city and 18 rural districts. First day registration showed an increase of 11 pupils in the high school over last year, and a decrease of 12 pupils in the grade school.

The four high school grades listed the following enrollments: Freshmen 28, sophomores 30, juniors 23 and seniors 27, making a total enrollment of 108.

The grade school enrollment, with teachers, was listed as follows: First 25, second 8, Mrs. Ball; third 13, fourth 14, Mrs. Hiatt; fifth 12, sixth 14, Miss Reimers; seventh 11, eighth 13, Mr. Leuther.

Enrollment in both the high and grade schools is expected to increase some within the next week or two.

Yamhill County Accounts For 2.4% of Total Jobs

A ten per cent gain in job placements in private industry was noted by the Oregon employment service for August, 3260 of the 5667 regaining a place in the industrial pattern of the state.

Figures compiled by the statistical department of the unemployment compensation commission, based on data from the 22 employment office centers in the state, showed McMinnville, covering Yamhill county, accounted for 135 or 2.4 per cent of the state total.

Yamhill Farmers to Receive Official Wheat Notification

Within a few days Yamhill county farmers will receive official notification cards of their 1939 wheat allotments, according to J. P. Jungwirth, chairman of the Yamhill County Agricultural Conservation Committee.

This allotment will be the acreage which a cooperator may plant in 1939 if he wishes to comply with the program. But seeding within the allotment is voluntary, states Mr. Jungwirth, and the state conservation office has informed the county committee that the 1939 compliance will be determined on the seeded acreage of wheat regardless of its purpose.

A period of 15 days will be allowed in which any appeals must be filed in connection with the 1939 wheat acreage allotment. These appeals must be filed in writing with the county committee within 15 days from the time the notices are mailed. This period also applies to all farms for which, through oversight, wheat acreage allotments have not been determined.

Annual School Meeting to Be Held Here October 13

On page eight will be found legal notice of the annual school meeting for joint district 30/44 of Yamhill-Polk counties to be held October 13 at 8 p.m., in the schoolhouse in Willamina. This does not include the high school district since a new union high district was recently formed.

The purpose of the meeting is to discuss the budget for the coming year and to vote on the proposition of levying a district tax.
