Christmas Seal Sale to Get Under Way in Willamina Next Monday

Three children lifting up tiny voices in a carol of the season is the pictorial theme of the 1940 Christmas Seal of the National Tuberculosis association. Mrs. Fred Beatty, general chairman of the Christmas Seal campaign in Willamina, reports that the seal sale will start next Monday, Nov. 25, under sponsorship of the Willamina Civic club.

Mrs. Beatty briefly outlined the history and facts about the seal sale and tuberculosis organizations, stating that the idea originated in Denmark in 1904. In 1907, the first Christmas Seal sale in America was launched in Delaware and netted \$3000.

With newspapers and other organizations cooperating, the following year netted \$135,000. In 1910 the National Tuberculosis association joined the American Red Cross in order to put over its seal sale more effectively. This partnership lasted for 10 years. In 1920 the National Tuberculosis association conducted its seal sale alone and has been a separate organization since. Each
