Well, Neighbors - - -

When the WILLAMINA LOCKER PLANT came into the present ownership, the fine sharp-freeze mechanism had fallen into disuse. Meat products were loaded into vegetable crates and stacked before the locker room blower with the result that locker room temperatures were higher than desirable.

The same condition would result if products were allowed into lockers before freezing. Even at chill room or refrigerator temperatures (36 degrees) these products are like stoves radiating heat into products already frozen. The warm products tend to mat together, and slow freezing forms large ice crystals, breaking down cells and separating natural juices. The frozen products tend to dry out through temperature fluctuation.

Your locker and your home freezer both should be considered storage space for pre-frozen products, just as your refrigerator is storage space for pre-cooled vegetables and dairy products.

The critical range in freezing is 32 to 24 degrees. Ice crystals form in this range, and that takes power. Time-temperature graphs show it may take 2-3 hours to bring products through crystallization, and perhaps half an hour to get from 24 to zero.

Research has shown that the more rapidly this range is crossed, the smaller the ice crystals, and the more like fresh the products come out. The ideal is under 30 minutes, and it has been demonstrated that meat products frozen before wrapping (as in the No-Air Wrap wax-dip method, which we use) can be frozen in this range. And with wrapped goods you more nearly approach this ideal by use of the sharp-freeze.
