### ... IN THE FIELD OF POLITICS

The time is very near when voters must give their undivided attention to the most important of all civic duties—the selection of official servants.

Unless there has been some change since the selection of the forty-fourth legislative assembly, Oregon is a one-party state insofar as the legislature is concerned. (In the house, 58 Republicans, 2 Democrats; in the senate, 25 Republicans, 5 Democrats.) In reviewing the field of candidates and beginning at home, this newspaper is pleased with the record of Carl H. Francis as a representative of Yamhill County. During the last legislature, Representative Francis worked consistently for legislation to benefit the greatest number, while it was obvious that many legislators tried to obtain legislation granting special privileges. His uncompromising stand in opposition to Senate Bill No. 99, often referred to as the Idaho Power Company Bill, and to the sales tax, we especially approve. Senate Bill No. 99 was passed over Governor Snell's veto and there was a great deal of other evidence that it was a special privilege measure and not in the interest of the common good.

A great effort was made to force the sales tax upon the people of the state by loading the referred bill with contingent legislation, when at the time there was every indication that a majority of the voters did not want a sales tax. Francis fought the proposal in the legislature and afterward as state chairman of the anti-Sales Tax committee led the opposition to the measure which was defeated in special election last fall in spite of the expensive campaigning of its well-heeled proponents.

It is our belief that a representative of the people, whatever office he holds and whether it is by election or appointment, who does not consider the wishes and the best interests of the majority, is a traitor to the cause of democratic government.

The record of Peter Zimmerman when formerly in the legislature we approve and as it will be necessary to elect two representatives from Yamhill county, we would be pleased to see Francis and Zimmerman selected as the candidates.

### ... AN IMPORTANT ISSUE

In the primary contest for governor of Oregon, we believe Douglas McKay has much the best record of the Republican slate, although we do not see eye to eye with him on the question of piling up huge reserves of income tax receipts as a future property offset while we cast about for new ways of providing funds for the current deficit. Nevertheless, we feel that a graver issue is at stake. Mr. McKay is the only candidate for governor who is vigorously protesting against any relaxation in laws governing gambling and liquor control. His voting record in the past shows that he has consistently fought the persistent efforts of organized racketeers to make Oregon another Nevada. Gambling and liquor, unless under rigid government control, give the underworld an open sesame to plunder the public. It is not merely a moral or religious issue. It deals with the safety and economic welfare of every one of us, as well. The underworld is ruthless and destructive—it tears down what responsible citizens try to build up. Any aid given liquor and gambling interests—and they are constantly on the prowl for larger fields and more power—is building up a force that seeks to crush decent government.

The man who finds his relaxation in a friendly game of poker and enjoys an occasional glass of whiskey is—if he is a thoughtful citizen—as much opposed to letting down the bars to the organized gambling and liquor fraternity as the churches or other social welfare groups. Some labor unions have, in the past, thrown their support to proposed legislation legalizing the sale of liquor by the drink. Members of locals would do well to stop and think before endorsing such doubtful legislation. Racketeers have muscled into labor unions in other states with disastrous results for the laborers. Why give them an invitation to accumulate power in Oregon by relaxing our laws governing liquor and gambling?

Personally, we believe McKay will be a good man to have around when the Willie Bioffs and Al Capones come knocking on our door.

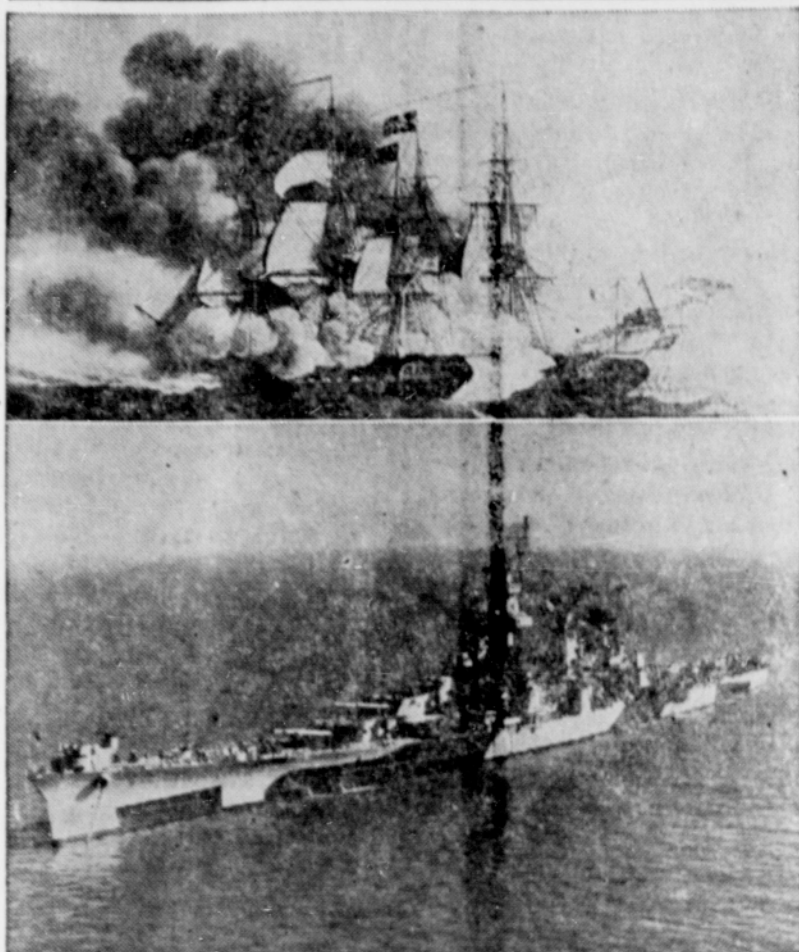

## SEA FIGHTERS CHANGE ARMOR - - NOT HEARTS

## Time to Spray Walnuts County Agent Advises

Time is approaching for walnut growers to spray or dust for walnut blight control according to Louie Gross, county agent.

The first application is applied in the early preblossom stage, when about 50 percent of the buds have broken open and the leaves folded lengthwise are beginning to separate from one another, but before the blades of the leaflets have unfolded.

If spraying is followed, a 4-2-100 Bordeaux mixture (4 pounds copper sulphate, 2 pounds quick lime, 100 gallons water) is the recommended material. To this should be added one pint of summer oil emulsion to reduce the severity of leaf damage.

If dusting is the practice, a copper-lime-sulphur-oil dust composed of 20 percent monohydrated copper sulphate, 40 percent hydrated lime, 10 percent dusting sulphur, 20 percent talc, 8.5 percent diatomaceous earth, and 1.5 percent light mineral oil is recommended for general use.

If the walnut orchard is inter-

planted with filberts, the sulphur should be omitted from the formula as sulphur is toxic to filbert foliage, Gros, concludes.
