ment and education funding stems from the income tax.

In view of all the factors involved, many (including some of those currently wrestling with various tax reform proposals) are beginning to wonder if there is a suitable alternative to the present tax system.

It doesn't take an election to prove people resent taxes. But Oregon taxpayers carry their share of the burden and have proven their willingness to pungle up for schools and social programs at a rate that has earned their state a "high service" reputation when it comes to caring for the less financially, physically and mentally fortunate.

Now comes the suggestion the so-called tax rebellion has progressed space with inflation. Rising costs of all kind cuts deeply into every pocketbook, be it that of a homeowner or renter. At the same time Oregon has become more urbanized and the demands for local government services have skyrocketed as a result.

Local government today is Oregon's fastest growing "business." And from an employment standpoint, few endeavors match the 151,600 workers receiving government paychecks. State and local education, for instance, employ more than all the lumber and wood products industries put together.

One can't help but wonder if Oregon voters aren't becoming more concerned with spending than funding. Refusal to accept fiscal ballot measures doesn't necessarily mean people don't want quality education or the services of local government.

It could mean they do want things changed. Perhaps they believe they're paying enough now. Inflation has meant they've had to tighten their belts.

Maybe they do want reform. But to many, who are closest to the issue, there is a growing suspicion taxpayers don't want any revolutionary change in the way they pay their tax dollars. It's just possible they're trying to say they don't want to pay more than they are now and they'd like to get what you might call "more for their money's worth."

### UGN DRIVE UNDER WAY FOR VOLUNTEERS

A major United Good Neighbors drive is now underway in Yamhill county — not for funds at this point — but for volunteers to conduct the fund-raising effort which is scheduled for October.

Gordon Hall, McMinnville, UGN president, this year estimates that 175 volunteers will be necessary to conduct the drive — and he points out, volunteers at times are almost as hard to come by as money.

Horst Matschukat, Newberg, UGN second vice president, will be responsible for recruitment and serve as training director.

A special two-man committee heads the recruitment drive as such. Mrs. Harold Davis, McMinnville, has been named chairman for the southern area of the county which includes McMinnville, Amity, Dayton, Sheridan, Willamina and Lafayette. Heading the recruitment drive in the northern area will be Willis Johnson, manager U.S. National bank, Newberg. His area of responsibility will include Newberg, Carlton, Yamhill and Dundee.

Fifty-seven volunteer Yamhill county residents sit on the UGN board of directors the year-around. As soon as officers and board members are elected in January, preparation gets underway for the big fund drive in October, so much effort is on a 12-month basis.

Among workers already recruited are campaign chairman, John Brewster; and his committee who will carefully weigh budgets of member agencies; public relations chairman, Elaine Rohse; agriculture chairman, Stan Christensen.

Obtaining loaned executives will be one of the tasks of recruitment chairman. Last year 24 firms in Yamhill county "loaned" an employee to UGN for an entire week. Conservatively speaking these firms made a contribution in manpower of \$5,000 to the UGN effort.

In addition to loaned executives, city chairmen must be obtained — and in each instance chairmen will be lining up their own team of volunteers. Volunteers also do typing, envelope stuffing, filing and phoning.

Despite the urgent need for volunteers, Hall points out considerable expense, plus almost unestimable man hours are saved by combining the 35 different fund raising drives into one UGN effort. Repetitive effort of drives is eliminated by having only one UGN drive for the 35 participating agencies.

## CERTIFICATION OF

## ACREAGE UNDER WAY

The certification of acreages for the 1972 wheat and feed grain programs is well under way according to Eldon Fendall, Yamhill County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee chairman.

All farm operators must certify their acreages of wheat, barley, corn, set-aside and conserving base crops at the county ASC office before program payments can be made. The deadline for accepting certifications is June 15, 1972.

A special emphasis is being placed this year on the quality of set-aside acreage, which is the land taken out of grain production. This land must be as productive as the land on the farm planted to grain for harvest.

"The reason for the strong emphasis on quality of set-aside acreage is that this is the only way grain production can be controlled on a national basis," said Chairman Fendall. "Farmers have the freedom now to plant any amount of grain they desire and the only control over the total grain grown is this acreage taken out of production."

Farmers who wish to have the quality of their set-aside checked may do so by applying at the ASC office. The charge for this service is the same as for measurement work, \$6 for the first hour and \$4 for any additional hours. Measurement work can be done at the same time if needed. Many producers are having their wheat measured for yield purposes this year.

Yamhill county farmers will earn nearly one million dollars under the 1972 wheat and feed grain programs. The payments are partly provided by the miller for the domestic wheat he uses. If production is successfully held down by setting aside good land, then prices at the market place should be more favorable.

Participating farmers can certify at any time after their spring grain is planted. Early certification in most cases will mean an earlier preliminary payment. Payments are scheduled to start shortly after July 1st.
