Chamber of Commerce regularly publishes the results of three organizations which attempt to measure the effectiveness of members of Congress. They are the ACA (Americans for Constitutional Action — conservative), the ADA (Americans for Democratic Action — liberal) and labor's national COPE organization.

Each "grades" Congressmen on the basis of the manner in which they vote on selected measures. A rating of 100 would mean voting 100% "right" on the selected issues. Lesser ratings mean varying degrees of "wrong" votes.

Current ratings, or grades, reflect data collected during the 1971 session of the 92nd Congress and, in the Oregon delegation's case, each member's cumulative standing.

Here, according to ACA,

ADA and COPE, is a "report card" on Oregon's six members of Congress:

Sen. Mark Hatfield (R), who went to Congress in 1960, owns a 51.6 per cent voting record on the selected measures of the three organizations. The conservative ACA gave him a score of 20 for 1971 and a cumulative rating of 32. Liberal ADA gave him a score of 74 during 1971 (it does not maintain a cumulative rating). Labor's COPE gave the Oregon Senior Senator a score of only 33 last year — against a cumulative total of 70.

Sen. Bob Packwood, who went to Washington in 1968, owns a 50.2 per cent voting record. Conservative ACA gave him a score of 60 in 1971, against a cumulative 48. Liberal ADA ranked him with a 30 in 1971. Labor's COPE gave Packwood a 20 last year — against a cumulative total of 48.

On the House side, First Dist. Rep. Wendell Wyatt (R) owns a 72 per cent voting record while serving his fourth term. Conservative ACA gave him a score of 75 in 1971 and cumulative rating of 69. Liberal ADA gave him 16 during 1971. Labor's COPE gave Wyatt a 36 last year — against a cumulative 31.

Second Dist. Rep. Al Ul-

man (D) has a 71 per cent voting record while serving his eighth term. Conservative ADA gave him a score of 28 last year and a cumulative total of 14. Liberal ADA gave him a 49 in 1971. And labor's COPE gave Ulman a 20 last year — against a cumulative grade of 86.

Fourth Dist. Rep. John Dellemack (R) owns a 59 per cent voting record while serving his third term. Conservative ACA gave him a score of 57 in 1971 and a cumulative rating of 56. Liberal ADA gave him a 43 in 1971. Labor's COPE gave Dellemack a 25 in 1971 — against a cumulative 35.

Although the ratings make interesting reading, the comparisons between "performance" in a give year and the cumulative ratings tend to point up further the difficulty of casting lawmakers according to their voting records. Senator Hatfield's grade of 33 last year by COPE, for instance, might hurt him in the eyes of some labor rank-and-filers if they weren't aware of his cumulative grade of 70. Other labor-oriented constituents, on the other hand, might tend to suspect the Senior Senator of back-sliding in their behalf by comparing the two and wonder if he is changing his philosophy. Some of Mrs. Green's constituents might wonder the same type of thing regard-

ing her voting record in 1971, compared with the cumulative total during her 18 years in the House of Representatives.

Clearly the best method an Oregon voter has of grading his Legislators and Congressmen is to first understand the system and then get to know the people well enough to trust them to vote their consciences in the best interests of a basic philosophy — most of the time.
