Sports highlight board meeting

Sports high-lighted the March 14th Sheridan School Board meeting. The board authorized the construction of a high jump pit, a long jump and pole vault ramp to be located near the west end of the high school track. The total cost of the project is \$546. The Lettermen's Club is donating \$100 and the Boosters \$200. The remainder of the funds had been previously appropriated.

Mr. DeHart announced that the grade school league is studying the feasibility of going on a split season with basketball and wrestling. This would have the basketball season ending before wrestling begins. The board gave ap-

proval for the split season if the league decides to adopt the plan. Starting with the 73-74 season, the board voted to limit the interscholastic athletic activities competition to 7th and 8th graders in all sports but track and wrestling. Also approved was a coach for soft ball and a coach for track for girls at Chapman School.

Mr. Sears announced that on April 11th and 12th there will be a visiting team of educators from Yamhill, Marion and Polk counties to study the effectiveness and status of the high school. This is an in-depth study of facilities and curriculum.
