Students anticipate vacation

Despite a week long anticipation for the coming of spring break the students at Willamina Elementary School managed to keep busy this past week.

The school's first graders from room 4, Mrs. Laferty's room visited the Post Office on a field trip. Each student took along a letter he had written. At the Post Office they each bought stamps and then mailed their letters.

Post Master Jack Shetterly then took the class on a tour of the Post Office showing them what happens to a letter or a package from the time it's mailed until it leaves the Post Office.

The students were amazed to see how rapidly a letter arrives at its destination as most of the students received the letters that they had just mailed.

The students will visit the fire station and the Shenk farm in the near future.

Mrs. Miller's third grade class has been studying towns in the United States both past and present and the changes that the towns have undergone.

As part of their studies they built a model town of the mid 1800's complete with covered wagons and a fort.

Because of the interest in covered wagons the class built a large covered wagon that is on display in the classroom.

On March 6 the third grade went on a field trip at the Alpenrose Dairy in Portland.

There they saw many animals including cows, pigs, ponies, geese and a donkey.

The class was also shown how milk is processed and packaged. They were then given a tour of the dairy and were shown a collection of old cars and old music making machines.

Out of the whole trip two things proved to be the most exciting for the students and they were the treat of ice cream and cookies supplied by the dairy and the pony rides.

In conjunction with a science unit Mrs. Brian's third grade class has been making animals from old boxes. The students will then vote on the funniest, cutest and most original animals with prizes to be awarded at their room birthday party on March 30.

Room 5 played host to two interesting and interested visitors this past week. In the interest of touch, feel, watch and learn science experiments the students compared Molasses and Nancy.

Nancy is a week old goat and Molasses is a little black lamb. They are owned by Mrs. Swanson who was their to offer information to the class about the animals.

The class has also been studying birds recently and has had an excellent chance to do this with the return of the birds to the area. They have learned to identify the birds by their light patterns, color of feathers and body shapes.

They have also studied their nesting habits and have used the library extensively to further their studies.

The class has also been learning how to tell time by making a clock with movable hands and then playing games with the clock. They will next learn how to count money.

Since a visit to the class by Mrs. McRibben who told them a story about Tommy McTrot who loved to tell tall tales the class has been devoting a portion of Wednesday to telling tall tales.

The Willamina Grade School seventh and eighth grade Speech Class is working on a two-fold project.

As a part of the salesmanship unit, the students have been going out into the community and talking with the merchants. Their sales talk concerns a Pop Concert to be held Thursday, March 29. This concert is a fund-raising project for the up-coming Outdoor School.

If the merchants give a donation for this project, their names and a small ad (designed by the Art Department) will be listed in the program for the Pops Concert. For the Merchant donating the most money, the Speech Class will present a commercial for that particular business.

Also, as a part of the concert, seven students are working on two puppet plays - THE FROG PRINCE and ALADDINS LAMP. All puppets, stage set, and dialog are prepared by the students.

The band, choir and speech classes of Willamina Grade School will present their first annual fund raising program on March 29, at 7:30 p.m. in the grade school gymnasium.

SPECIAL FEATURES will include an art fair, and a drawing for both adults and children.

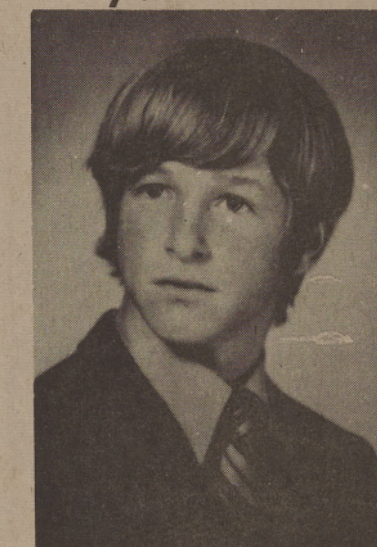
Admission is free, but plan to bring money for the special attractions mentioned. All proceeds will go for the outdoor school.

Career Education News: "Why do I have to go to school?" "What good is English going to do me?" "Why do I have to learn math?" "Why do I have to follow rules?"

Questions such as these are heard very often from some grade school students. When these are not just idle questions and the student really wants to know, the growing trend toward career education will help child, parent, and teacher to grasp the basic purpose of compulsory education in Oregon. Each youngster needs to understand that the learning and self discipline that go with regular school attendance and performance have a direct affect on his future as a student, an employable adult, and as a parent.

The Oregon State Department of Education has developed guidelines strongly emphasizing the relationship of all courses in grades kindergarten through 12 to the actual world of work. In kindergarten through grade 6 the accent is on the children becoming aware of the different jobs people work at. Grades 7-10 will discover and explore the very wide variety of occupations in our society. Grades 11 and 12 will provide opportunities for students to be involved in acquiring generalized occupational knowledge, preparation, and skills. Development of acceptable job attitudes, and involvement in cooperative work experiences are important at this level. Available to past-high school and adult persons are 13 community colleges, private vocational and technical schools and 4-year colleges and universities. The Oregon Career Education Program can be explained as follows:

K-6 Career Awareness
7-10 Career Exploration
11-12 Occupational Preparation
Post-High School and Adult Occupational Specialization
The total program provides for comprehensive and continuous growth in curriculum, participation, and guidance. Basic to the program is the awareness of one's self in relationship to the world of work and to society; a wholesome attitude toward work and society; an awareness of the many occupational careers available; experience in decision-making; and opportunities to explore and be involved in the various career clusters.
