My apologies to those who missed the Grand Ronde Socials column the past weeks.

Your correspondent did not curl up and die, nor did she get the sack, as perhaps some may have thought. The old gal was just out gadding.

She went to The Dalles for a yearly visit with relatives, which has been her custom for several years.

I spent one week with my sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Groce. Mrs. Groce and another sister, Mrs. Melvin Gatchel, met me at the bus depot. After lunch Mrs. Groce and I left for the Petersburg School, as she had to be there in time to take her school bus out. This trip was a real treat for me, as I used to be well acquainted along the route. Would you know those old canyons, creeks and roads looked about the same as they did 50 years ago? Except the roads had been widened in some places and there was a little more gravel used. On inquiry I found the same families lived on the same places, except now it is the younger generation, the grandchildren or nieces and nephews of the ones that I knew.

We attended the Tye Valley Rodeo. Now there is real fast and colorful action. The livestock is brought right in off the range. Many have never felt the hand of man before and those that have were used once and then turned out into the wild to run free again. There is no professional rodeo stock. The grand entry is a colorful pageant in itself. The Indians in full costume, the younger ones horseback and those to old to ride their horses were in decorated cars.

Entertainment featured saddle bronc riding, brama bull riding, roping, bulldogging, wild cow milking and wild horse racing. These events were followed by native dancing. Those Indian boys know how to put on a real

show and come from many other states and Canada to prove it.

On the grounds is the splendid type village, parking for trailers, campers and cars by the hundreds. There is also the usual concessions and rides that accompany all rodeos, and also the loudspeaker call for the lost parents of so and so a child to please report to the grandstand. We spent two wonderful days there.

Later I went to town and spent a week with my other sister and her husband, Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Gatchel. While there I was presented with a great great niece born May 27.

Mrs. Gatchel and I were downtown shopping when two ladies stopped to make a query, saying that they used to be residents of The Dalles, would you know that they were old classmates back in grade school days. One was Mr. Garnet Moore from as near as Tillamook.

Memorial Day we visited our family graves in the Odd Fellows cemetery, five generations of them.

Relatives gathered from Condon, Portland and me from Grand Ronde. This is our family reunion that we have a potluck luncheon in the park and catch up on the family goings and comings. Only one thing to blight the happiness of the time was the funeral of a very dear friend whom we called cousin.
