"I can't remember more than three or four times in all these years when

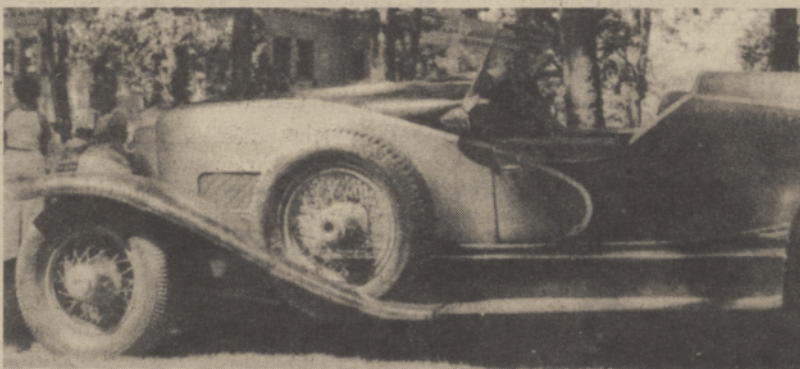
this baby wouldn't start," he says with a grin. "Come on, let's go for a ride."

Social Security Q & A

QUESTION: I plan to quit my regular job in December at age 65 and maybe take a part-time job paying \$500 a month. Could I receive my social security checks if I did that, or must I be completely retired?

ANSWER: A person 65 through 71 years of age in 1981 can earn up to \$5,500 and receive all benefits due for the year. Then \$1 in benefits will be withheld for each \$2 in earnings over \$5,500. If you work in all months of 1981 and earn \$6,000 (which is \$500 more than the exempt amount), \$250 in benefits would

be withheld in your case.

QUESTION: My grandfather is in poor health and needs someone to do his marketing and help with household chores. He gets SSI payments, and I've heard that SSI recipients are eligible for social services. Where can I find out what services are available in our community?

ANSWER: You can get information about social services in your area from your state or local social services or welfare office. Or, the people in any social security office can tell you about services available to your area and put you in touch with the office that can help you.

AuCOIN NAMED TO HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE

Oregon Congressman Les AuCoin has been named to serve on the powerful House Appropriations Committee.

The fourth-term Democrat's appointment to the committee, considered one of the three most influential in the House, was announced by the Democratic Steering and Policy Committee the day after the 97th Congress convened.

Speaker of the House Thomas P. O'Neill, who supported AuCoin's bid for appointment to the Appropriations Committee, said the Steering and Policy Committee "made an excellent choice in Les AuCoin for reasons of fairness, regional balance and recognition of the need for able new leaders."

"Over the last six years in Congress, Les has earned the respect of colleagues on both sides of the aisle as an imaginative, effective legislator who believes in teamwork," O'Neill said.

AuCoin's appointment preserves an Oregon voice on the Appropriations Committee. Outgoing Congressman Bob Duncan was the state's sole representative on the 54-member panel.

"To have lost representation on this committee would have been a great blow to Oregon," AuCoin said. "The federal budget is a dollars-and-cents statement of national priorities, so it is crucial for Oregon to retain its position of influence in the appropriation process."
