NEW: GARDENING TIPS • VERNONIA GROWN

Gardners must prepare properly to reap full harvest

In thinking about doing these weekly articles, it was obvious that there would be no way to cover all aspects of gardening in Vernonia - or anyplace else for that matter. What I hope to do is to share with you some of what I've learned over the last 10 years gardening in our area. Hopefully there will be some good advice for the less experienced gardener and maybe the more experienced can pick up an idea or two, also. Of course, anytime my suggestions aren't what they should be or when you know of something

that worked better for you, I would appreciate hearing from you.

As with every other part of the country, Vernonia has it's unique gardening problems due to climate, soil, growing season and other factors. But, I have found that most all common garden crops do quite well here, save for certain warm weather varieties, and we'll get into more detail on these later on. As you may expect, just about all root crops, berries and leafy vegetables do incredibly well in this climate. And, there are new varieties coming along every season that should be tried, at least, as time spent in the garden is never wasted.

Before much can be done in the way of planning and seed selection, the location of your garden must be made. Within reason, the garden should be in a fairly level area, hopefully well drained and where the sun will hit it all day long. Look out for places that might be sunny now,

but shaded when the trees leaf out. Next, what kind of soil is there? Most soil in our area is "heavy", with an abundance of clay. The ideal soil is about one-third humus, one-third sand and one-third clay. Very few garden plots start out with this ideal balance, and you'll probably need to add humus as time and energy will allow. Well rotted manure and other composted material tilled in this spring will be well worth the time and effort involved. Composting and tilling will be discussed later.

After deciding on the location of your garden, you should think about what size you want it to be. Don't try to take on more than you think you can handle, especially the first year. Start small and see how you like it. For a small family, a space of about 20 x 30 feet would be a good start. You'll be amazed at how much you can grow in a space this size - and amazed again at the money you can save. I know of no other form of

family activity that is as enjoyable as raising a garden, both in terms of recreation and the satisfaction that comes from harvesting the results of your efforts. But, before you get completely carried away remember there is work involved. Tilling, planting, weeding, cultivating and harvesting will require a certain amount of dedication and backbending work, but the rewards will far outweigh any amount of time and effort. I know of nothing more delicious than hot buttered corn picked just minutes before or a warm vine ripened tomato picked and eaten on a summer day out in the garden. The words "garden fresh" will take on an entirely new meaning. And, for those of you that are worried about your prospects for success, as Jim Crockett pointed out in his book on gardening, "I recommend plain uncomplicated faith, or if faith is lacking, then elementary logic....there is no mystery about gardening, just the wonderful fact that seed time and harvest occur each year, generation after generation, wherever the soil is tilled".
