Will run in District 1 Bugas announces Senate candidacy

State Representative Ted Bugas (R-Astoria) announced last week that he is running for State Senator for District 1. District 1 is comprised of all of Clatsop and Columbia counties, and part of Washington County.

"One of the major reasons I'm running is to provide our area with more effective representation in the Oregon Senate. It was quite clear to those who watched the 1981 Legislature that the Senate was up to its knees with politicians, people whose main interest was in playing petty partisan games. Time and again, they put politics before people," Bugas said. "A good example is when they refused to pass a reform of Oregon's land use laws. The House had to take the lead and practically shove it down the Senate's throat."

Bugas is currently serving his third term in the Oregon House, first elected in 1976. He has served on the powerful House Judiciary Committee and the Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee since his first term in 1977. In the 1979 and 1981 session, he also served on the leadership committee of the House, Legislative Rules and Operations.

"Without question, the biggest issues in this election year will be jobs and the economy. Too many people in the Legislature talk a good game about how they are going to fight to provide more jobs. And yet little is done," Bugas said. "The last Legislature didn't do much to help out our economy, and yet that is the cause of most of this state's problems. We can't afford to ignore what is at the root of our problems, a stumbling economy, much longer."

Bugas said he would advocate using such incentives as tax credits to

encourage business to expand and restricting the increasing flow of bureaucratic rules and regulations which are nothing more than stumbling blocks for small businesses or people who want to start a business.

"In my opinion, Oregon's economy is dangerously close to the edge of disaster. The Legislature in the next session can pull it off that ledge or push it over. I just think people in Columbia, Clatsop and Washington counties need a stronger voice in the Senate. We must put a breath of life back into our economy and put Oregonians back to work," Bugas said.

Cold weather creates fire hazards

The coming months of cold weather are expected to create new fire hazards related to heating equipment. This was the leading cause of fire in Oregon last year, and 70 percent of those were caused by wood heating appliances. Oregonians can best protect their family from fire by observing a few simple fire prevention practices.

Persons planning to purchase a wood heater are encouraged to choose one that carries a listing by a recognized testing agency, and to be sure the entire installation is done

according to manufacturer's instructions.

Chimneys should be inspected semi-annually, and buildups of creosote removed to reduce the chance of a dangerous chimney fire.

Proper installation and maintenance of smoke detectors could reduce Oregon's residential fire deaths by an estimated 79 percent.

Forced air furnaces should be serviced annually for safe, efficient operation.

Residential fires can be reduced by the same factors that cause them—men, women and children.
