

USDA Food Distribution Program

Our new warehouse location in Siletz is proving very satisfactory. There was an excellent response from most of the participating Tribal members.

The nutrition theme for the month of June is "Fruit Provides Nutrition, Too!" Wynona Harrison, IHS Nutritionist from Chemawa, will have a demonstration at the June 10 distribution regarding this theme. Below you will find two recipes, for use with the commodities:

April Demo. RICE & VEGETABLES

- 1 can pork or chicken
- 1 small can green peas
- 1 small can diced carrots
- ¼ tsp. garlic powder
- 2 to 4 cups cooked rice*
- 2 Tbs. finely chopped onion
- ½ tsp. pepper

Cook pork until heated through. Pour off drippings and save. Remove pork. Measure back 2 Tbs. drippings into frying pan, add rice, onion, garlic powder and pepper. Mix lightly. Add peas and carrots and cook slowly, stirring constantly until heated through, about 5 minutes. Fold in pork. Serve hot. Makes 6 servings, approximately 2/3 cup each.

* If you like a dish with lot of rice, use 4 cups cooked rice.

June Demo. SURPRISE CAKE

- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup sugar
- ½ cup butter
- 1 can crushed pineapple*
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/3 cup dry non-fat milk
- 1 cup water

Melt butter in baking dish. Mix all ingredients except pineapple and put into baking dish. Pour fruit on top of mixture 30 minutes at 350 degrees F.

* Or fruit of your choice (peaches, pears, apricots).

MUST I TALK TO A MACHINE?

Some people find it very pleasant to have to talk to a machine. As many of you may know, I am the only personnel located at the USDA Warehouse on a full-time basis. When I have to leave the building to pick up mail, meetings, etc., this leaves the phone to be answered by a machine. If you use the machine it not only saves me time, but you time in having to call back. When you call and I am not here to answer the phone, please leave your name, telephone number and a message and I will return your call as soon as I am back in the office.

FOOD DISTRIBUTION PROGRAM

The Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations is a program of the Food and Nutrition Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. This program provides foods for good health to households living on Indian Reservations or near the Reservation of a Tribe of which they are members. For a household to qualify the following must be met:

1. ADULT TRIBAL MEMBER
 - a. There must be at least one Tribal Member in the household.
 - b. That Tribal Member must be at least 18 years of age or older.
2. FOOD PROGRAM SERVICE AREA (15 Counties)
 - a. All eligible Tribal members may be served in the regular eight-county service area (Benton, Lane, Linn, Lincoln, Marion, Polk, Yamhill and Tillamook)
 - b. Seven additional counties (Clatsop, Coos, Columbia, Washington, Multnomah, Clackamas and Douglas) are available for service with one restriction; eligible Tribal Members living in these counties must reside in a rural setting (towns with a population of 10,000 or less).
3. FOOD STAMPS
 - a. You cannot participate in both the Food Stamp and Food Distribution Programs during the same months. You may however, switch from one program to the other with ten (10) days notice.

Siletz Employment Program

The Siletz Employment Program is now in operation, serving clients in the Tribal eight-county service area of Tillamook, Lincoln, Benton, Yamhill, Polk, Marion, Linn and Lane counties. As this article goes to press, the Program has a total of 39 participants. Twenty-two clients are in Work Experience training positions with various public entities, fourteen clients are in Classroom training, and three clients are in the On-the-Job Training positions with employers in the private sector.

On-the-Job Training positions are proving to be the most difficult positions for the Program to develop for clients because of the depressed employment situation in the private sector. These On-the-Job Training positions are the most beneficial to the Program participants because they offer an opportunity to transition to regular, unsubsidized employment. All three area Counselors are attempting to develop more such positions with private employers for Program participants.

The Siletz Area, (Tillamook, Benton and Lincoln counties) is looking for clients interested in obtaining their GED. If you are interested, contact Mary Lane at the Siletz Area Office, 444-2536.

SUMMER FOSTER

The Indian Child Welfare Program is actively recruiting for a family who would like to provide a foster home for two teenage tribal boys for the summer. Ideally the home would be in the Siletz area, but any interested families would be welcomed. 4. RESOURCES

- a. All households may have up to \$1,750 worth of resources, i.e. cash, checking or savings accounts, stocks, bonds, etc.
- b. Households of two or more persons may have up to \$3,000, if at least one member is age 60 or over.

5. INCOME

- A. Your eligibility for commodities is also based on how much income, such as earnings or pensions, you have after deductions. Deductions from income are:
 - a. Twenty (20) percent of EARNED income.
 - b. Child care or care for a disable adult if these services are needed so a household member can work, look for a job, get job training or go to school.
- B. Only households with net monthly income within the allowable limits may qualify for commodities. The amount of income you are allowed and the amount of food you can receive depends on the size of your household.

NAME CHANGE ON ROLL

TO ALL TRIBAL MEMBERS: As there seems to be some confusion concerning "Change of Name" on the Tribal Roll, Tribal Council has directed the Enrollment Dept. to publish the following excerpts from the Enrollment Ordinance 8-01, which the Enrollment Dept. must follow on procedures concerning the Tribal Roll:

1. AUTHORITY: The authority for this action is vested in the Tribal Council by the Constitution of the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians of Oregon adopted June 2 1979, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior June 13, 1979, under Article I, Section 2.

2. PURPOSE: The purpose of this ordinance is to provide for the development and maintenance of the Tribal membership roll of the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians of Oregon.

3. ENROLLMENT STAFF:

(d) Records: The staff shall maintain appropriate records to support its recommendations and maintain the roll as accurately as possible. The records shall include originals or copies of documentaton received in support of applications, including addresses, birth dates, birth certificates, dates of death, death certificates, change of names, etc.

6. PROOF

- A. Proof of income, such as pay stubs, or letters from Social Security
- B. Proof of the amount of resources
- C. Proof of Tribal Enrollment
- D. Proof of the amount of money spent on child or disabled care.
