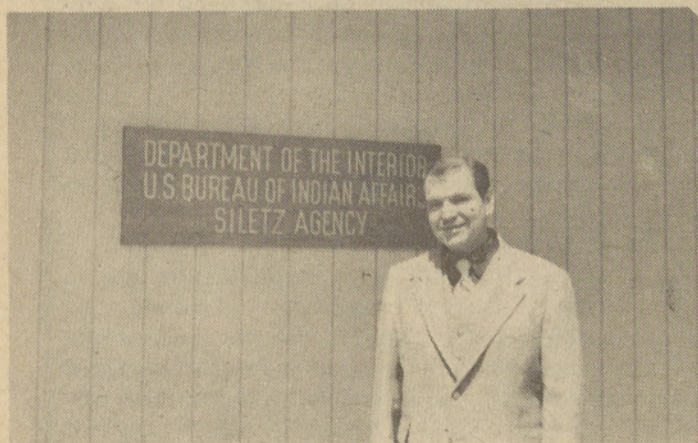
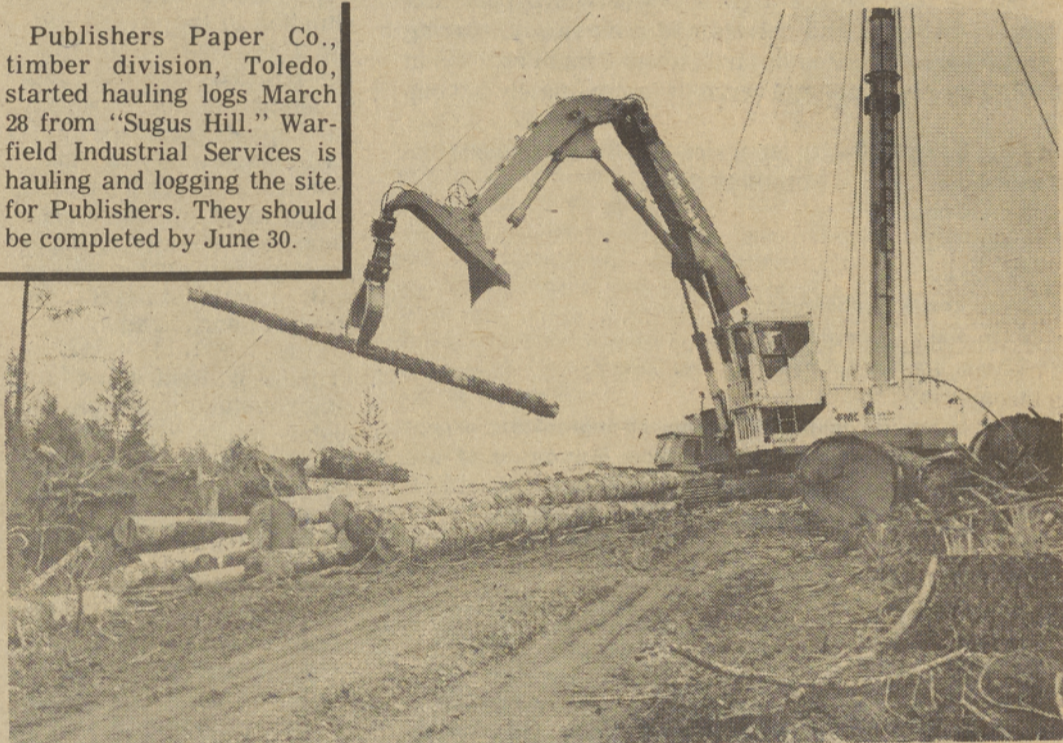
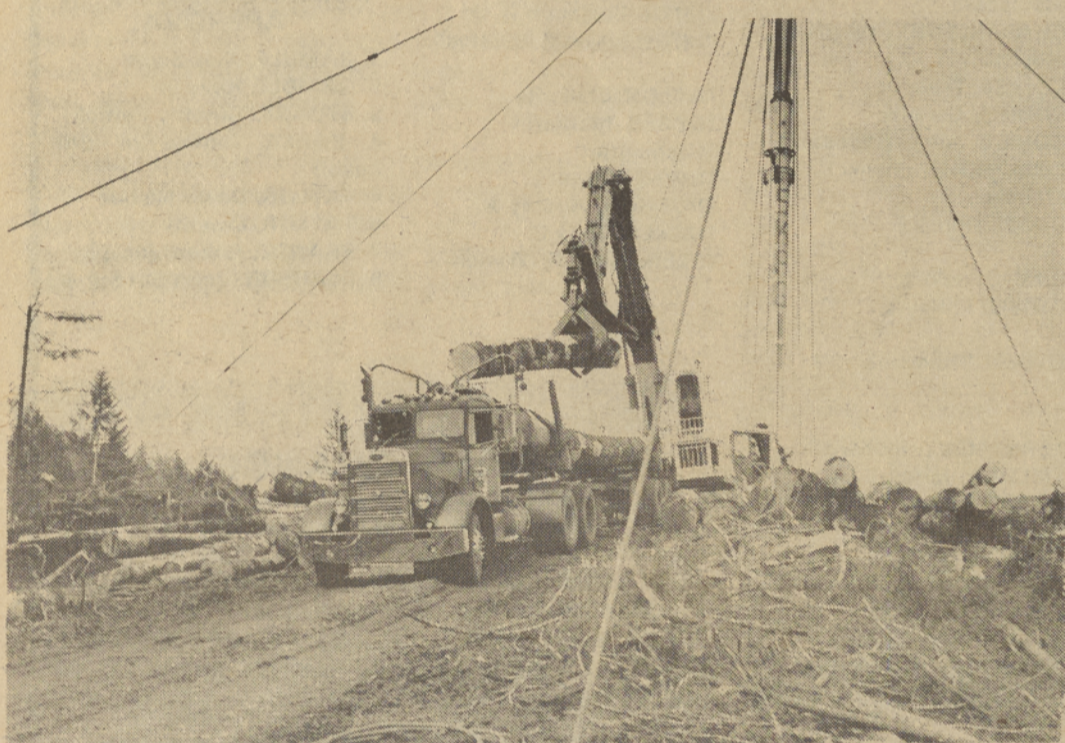




Trial Timber Logged
